Besides its nature, history and gastronomy, Portugal, whose citizens are its greatest value, is also known for its sunny weather, beaches, and historical and world heritage sites.

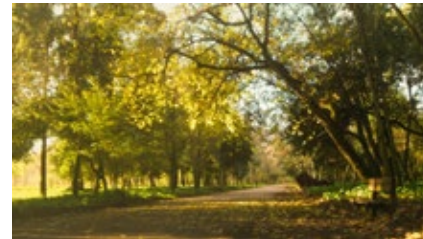

ABOUT COIMBRA

The city of students is unique in Portugal for all the mysticism which characterizes it and for its University, which has recently been recognized as a World Heritage Site by UNESCO. Surrounded by love tales and great historic achievements, Coimbra has some peculiar customs and traditions that other Portuguese cities have been imitating over the years. Académica is one of the oldest and prestigious football Clubs of Portugal, having won two National Cups.



ABOUT FADU, UNIVERSITY, AND ACADÉMICA

Coimbra is focused on sports and has proven its passion for sports.

The University of Coimbra offers different courses within the field of Sport Sciences and Physical Education: 1 Bachelor degree course, 4 Master's Degree courses and 2 PhD courses.

AAC has 26 sports departments, providing its players, aged 3 to 80 years old, with 40 different sport activities. In Coimbra there are several outdoor sites, gyms, fields, waterways and pools where citizens can do sports for leisure.

In 2018 Coimbra will have the best sport infrastructures to host this event. The bid application for the EUG2018 moved us to apply for European funds (NSRF) in order to build and rebuild infrastructures with excellent conditions for hosting game competitions.

AAC and the University of Coimbra won the prize for Best European University in University Sports three times in a row and they have both organized two European championships in three years, helping promote the EUSA name.

FADU is a very active NUSA and due to its role in the organisation of the European Universities Championships in four sports, hosting the EUSA Conference and supporting participation of more than 470 student athletes in 17 sports, the Most Active NUSA Award for 2017 went to the Portuguese University Sports Federation (FADU).



ABOUT FADU

The Portuguese University Sports Federation (FADU) is a sports federation which focuses on sport as a tool in training and education, with its origin in a movement of various national academies aimed at stimulating, encouraging and organizing sport in Higher Education. Founded on March 2, 1990, it is recognized as Sports Public Utility since 1995, having grown over the years, both in terms of organized activities and in terms of the number of participants. It is considered today one of the largest sports federations in our country.

Portugal has won the prize for Best European University several times and NUSA (FADU - Portuguese University Sports Federation) was awarded as the most active sports federation.

And last but not least, we are proud to be part of a NUSA that has been deeply involved and is very dynamic in EUSA activities since the beginning, as stated in the bid for the 1st and 2nd EUSA Games.



ABOUT UNIVERSITY OF COIMBRA

Coimbra has a growing foreign students' epicenter, the University of Coimbra is a strong promoter of the event's success. ABOUT ACADÉMICA

Académica Students Association (AAC) is responsible for the traditional praxis, a reception ritual of the freshmen and freshwomen, for organizing the academic festival known as Queima das Fitas (one of the greatest in Europe) and Festa das Latas, and for spreading Coimbra's song, Fado, worldwide, thus creating the most heterogeneous student community in the country.





SCAC

SCAC is the highest authority of the EUG and controls the overall organizational and technical aspects of the EUG. The SCAC is responsible for the interpretation of EUSA Regulations, for the supervision and smooth-running of the EUG, settling any dispute, examining and dealing with any complaints or protests of a non-technical nature, taking emergency sanctions against participants (teams or individuals) who violate the EUSA Regulations, deciding any other matters not covered in these Regulations, at the time of the EUG.

The SCAC is composed of: SVC members, OC Chair, OC Sport Director and two (2) other representatives; led by SVC Chair. The mandate of the SCAC members terminates with the conclusion of the EUG. SCAC Members shall cooperate in a way to find a compromise by taking decisions unanimously. In case of voting, decisions will be taken by a simple majority of those present and voting. In case of equality of votes, the SCAC Chair shall have a casting vote. All decisions taken by the SCAC at the time of the EUG are final.

VISA Procedure

Regarding entry formalities, citizens of the European Union, Bulgaria, Cyprus, Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway, Romania and Switzerland only need an identity card to enter Portugal.

In addition to their identity card, minors must also present a valid authorisation document signed by their parents to travel.

For visits of less than 90 days, a passport valid for at least three months after the end of their stay is necessary for visitors from Albania, Andorra, Antigua and Barbuda, Argentina, Australia, Bahamas, Barbados, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Brazil, Brunei, Canada, Chile, Costa Rica, Croatia, Guatemala, Holy See, Honduras, Israel, Japan, Macedonia, Malaysia, Mauritius, Mexico, Monaco, Montenegro, New Zealand, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Saint Kitts and Nevis, San Marino, Serbia, Seychelles, Singapore, South Korea, United States of America, Uruguay, Venezuela, Special Administrative Regions of the People's Republic of China in Hong Kong and Macao and Taiwan territorial Authority.

Citizens from countries not mentioned above need a visa to enter Portugal, which may be requested at the Portuguese Embassy or Consulate of their country for stays of up to 90 days.

Under the terms of the Convention Implementing the Schengen Agreement, flights between Schengen states are considered to be internal flights and passengers do not need to obtain another visa.

Climate

The climate in Coimbra is rather mild throughout the year, and temperatures never get extremely hot or cold. However, during the hottest months like July temperatures can be significantly high with a normal maximum average temperature around 28°C and a lower around 15°C. In terms of humidity it is normally below 60%.

OVERVIEW

The EUG 2018 will be the biggest multisport event ever organized in Portugal and will count with the participation of more than 4000 athletes competing in 13 sport specialties from 350 Universities of 40 Countries. We will count with around 1000 volunteers and 300 referees.

We will count with Para Table Tennis competition and canoe sprint will be in the games as a demonstrative sport.

The Organizing Committee has made a huge effort in order to host the games with significant refurbishments of the competition venues and, due to the increasing number of visitors in the past years, Coimbra is prepared to offer quality accommodation to all the participants.

The Games started in 2012 and are organized on a biennial basis, with European Universities Championships being organized in even years and individual events in odd years. The Games as such represent the largest European multisport student event. The event should inspire the interest for sport and its values, as a contribution to social understanding and change and should promote the interest in Coimbra, through innovative sport events, in the delivery of sport activities, a unique world class event and an irreplaceable experience for the students.

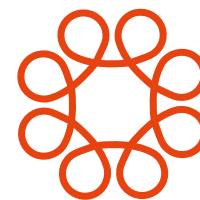

Volunteers are involved mainly in the following areas:
Accommodation; Accreditation; Attaché; Educational; IT;
Logistics; Media; Medical; Protocol; Transportation; Sports;
Volunteers Management.



In the sports venues, volunteers will provide an important support, in the sport activities, access controlling and informing athletes and other participants.

Each delegation will have an attaché allocated, who will be a point of contact, guiding and liaising the university team and the organization. The name and mobile phone of the attaché will be provided by the end of the accreditation procedure.

If for some reason your delegation, wouldn't receive that information, please contact the Volunteering Team.

The volunteering team has prepared a training plan, which was delivered online and onsite. The training includes general aspects of the events, functional responsibilities, practical instructions and visits to the venues. During all the event, there will be a volunteer's management system, supported by volunteer's team leaders and a dedicated area in the EUG 2018 mobile application.

The aim of the Volunteering team is to provide an enriching experience for all the participants in EUG 2018. Therefore there is a volunteer lounge area, a Social and Cultural Programme, which includes multiple activities, allowing volunteers to discover a place listed as UNESCO World Heritage and one of the oldest universities in the world. In the end of the event, certificates of participation be delivered to all volunteers.

THE ROLE OF THE HEAD OF DELEGATION

- make sure that arrival and departure details are sorted, both with team and transport office
- know the schedule of play
- know the transport schedule
- know the lunch and dinner times
- know how to reach emergency services
- have his team ready to play when required
- know how to get in touch with his players at all times
- compose and hand in the team compositions in time
- book practice courts when available
- attend the GTM and any other meeting called by the tournament referee. There may be many more things, but this is already quite an extensive list

ACCREDITATION PROCEDURE

The purpose of accreditation is to define the roles and responsibilities of the participants during the European Games and to provide them with the facilities necessary to successfully perform their duties/carry out their sport, as well as to ensure the general security of the participants moving around the European Games Venues. The Accreditation Card is the official document jointly issued by EUSA and the EUG 2018. The Accreditation Card will be issued once the accreditation procedures have been completed.

Main Accreditation Centre

The Main Accreditation Centre will be located at Silva Gaio School, near the University Stadium.

Accreditation Centre will also extend their opening hours according to the delegations' travel schedules.

To assure a better service, the Heads of Delegation are advised to arrive at the Accreditation Centre at least 1 or 2 days before the first competition day, in order to guarantee enough time to check the data entered in the accreditation system.

All the delegations must present a participant dossier which shall include all the information previewed in the follow rules

PARTICIPANT DOSSIER

REG 94 The delegation dossier to be presented to the control commission shall be completed in English and shall include:

REG 94.1 team list with names, surnames and functions of each delegation member; in addition: team/competitor international and national ranking, competitors shirt number and competition uniforms colour (if required by Technical Regulations),

REG 94.2 HOD or team representative and coach (if present) mobile phone number on which is/are reachable 24 hours per day during the competition,

REG 94.3 signed EUSA Participants Code of Ethics.

REG 94.4 the individual dossier for each competitor.

REG 95 The individual dossier for each competitor to be presented to the Control Commission shall be completed in English and include:

REG 95.1 a passport or national identity card (in classic Latin alphabet letters);

REG 95.2 if a current student: the EUSA certificate of Academic Eligibility (Individual Entry) originating from the appropriate academic authority certifying that the competitor is officially registered for and pursuing a course of study;

REG 95.3 if a former student: proof by the University and date of graduation.

ACCREDITATION CARD

The Accreditation Card is the only official and valid document for EUG 2018 participants.

Therefore, it must always be clearly visible in order to access restricted event areas. The Accreditation Card contains information, personal identification number (consists of specific letter and numbers) and pictograms indicating all of the holder's rights as a cardholder.

Monitoring of access will be achieved through the Accreditation Cards, which will be checked at all site entrances. Depending on their category, each participant will be allowed to access certain areas. People not holding an Accreditation Card or holding a Card which does not have the required access rights will not be allowed to enter. Improper usage of personal Accreditation Cards is prosecutable by law and will be reported to the Security Operational Centre and to the Head of the delegation involved.

Loss of the Accreditation Card

In case of loss of the Accreditation Card, the participant must personally approach the EUG OC Accreditation Centre and report the loss by using a valid Identification document (passport or ID card). Enquiries about issuing replacement cards is to be made directly at the Accreditation Centre where new cards will be printed. In case of loss of the Accreditation Card, the owner of the Card will be charged for re-printing the new Card. Payment can be made in cash. The Replacement Accreditation Card will contain a new personal Identification number (consisting of specific letters and numbers). For the protection of the participants, once a card is replaced, the original card cannot be reactivated. If someone finds the lost Accreditation Card, they should bring it to the EUG OC Accreditation Centre. If the Card has been unintentionally damaged or is no longer functioning, they should also bring the damaged card to the OC Accreditation Centre for a replacement. Note, however, that the OC Accreditation Centre reserves the right to charge a replacement fee in the amount of 50€.

We will have the follow categories of accreditation:

Athletes, Officials, Referees, Nusa Coordinators, Nusa Guests, Nusa VIP, Medical Department, Volunteers, Media, Security External Services, Observers, Organizing Committee, EUSA, Technical Delegates.

Regular Procedure

Accreditation procedure is completed when the final approval for accreditation pass is issued by the EUG OC. The Head of Delegation will be responsible for taking over all accreditations for his/her team members in particular at the Accreditation Centre by presenting valid Passport or ID card for each participant. All procedures will be done in compliance with relevant EUSA Rules and Regulations:

REG 75 Accreditation procedure starts two (2) days before each competition. Competitors cannot be accredited after the GTM.

REG 76 Competitors are obliged to show the accreditation card to the official in charge of the match who allowed them to compete.

REG 77 If a person, who has been refused a competitor's accreditation card, attempts to compete by means of fraud, he/she will be excluded from the EUG and the EUSA EC will consider if this exclusion should apply also to all future sporting events of EUSA. Should this fraud be attempted in a team competition, the team may also be excluded from the competition and any earlier results in the current competition will be cancelled. A report will be forwarded to the respective NUSA, university and a reprimand will be addressed to the team and/or competitor and the NUSA of his country.

Extraordinary Procedure

In case of last minute changes, such as:

If a person that applied for accreditation in the first place has been replaced by a different individual, or some other possible reasons for delay in making and distribution of accreditation, an accredited person is supposed to take over his/her accreditation in person. The applicant must personally approach the EUG OC Accreditation Centre and present a valid Identification document (passport or ID card). In case of extraordinary procedure, EUG OC cannot predict the time of issuing the Accreditation Card.



ACCOMMODATION

Athletes & Officials

The Organizing Committee will offer an easy and comfortable experience to all participants during their stay in Coimbra for the European Universities Games 2018.

We will provide several accommodation units, in Coimbra and Montemor-o-velho, to ensure a pleasant stay for all participants and a level of involvement with the city. Participants will be placed in double, triple or quadruple rooms, all approved by EUSA and according with the EUSA General regulations.

All sports facilities can be reached by a shuttle service.

The distribution of the teams in the different accommodation units will be decided according to their sports, registration, distribution of rooms and safety concerns.

The OC only provides accommodation for the official competition dates.

All accommodations are fully secured. Only residents with valid accreditation cards will have access to the Accommodations.

Due to space limitations, athletes/teams same gender from same country can share rooms. Officials will share a double room with other official same gender but could be from different countries.

Categories of accommodation

- Athletes & Officials Type 3
- Referees Type 2
- EUSA Family & VIP Type 1
- General Coordination Type 1

The organization is not responsible for additional costs like mini bar and other personal services provided by the accommodation.



Check-In

Any damages found in the rooms after the arrival and accommodation of the participants can be reported at the OC Services Centre on the following day before 12:00. The problems will be written down in a protocol.

Laundry Service

The service will be provided by a professional laundry company at an office in the University Stadium, close to other services and facilities. Service starts on Friday, July 13th, the final drop off is on Saturday, July 28th, and the final pickup is on Sunday, July 29th. The service will be open every day from 09:00 am to 01:00 pm and from 02:30 pm to 08:00 pm, with two pickups and two drop offs. Each athlete will receive one laundry bag at accreditation and must be identified with name, surname and mobile number. Each bag is designed to hold a maximum of 9 kg of laundry and should fit at a designed box at the moment of drop off. The services must be paid in advance according to the amount of clothing delivered.

CATERING

Breakfast will be served buffet style in the nearby canteens or in the local accommodation. For lunch and dinner, the participants will have a designated canteen considering the place of accommodation, the place of competition and the competition schedule. Participants can choose from the menus at their disposal and will always have three different options (meat, fish, vegetarian) with detailed labelling of each dish. Referees, EUSA members and VIPs will have their meals in a distinctive buffet-style room. The meals will be prepared and served by the canteen staff who will wear distinctive uniforms determined by the facility. The quality and quantity of food will be within the EUSA minimum requirements. The facilities will be running between 07.00 and 22.00 hours, with breaks between meals due to the need for cleanings and the staff's need to prepare for the next meal. 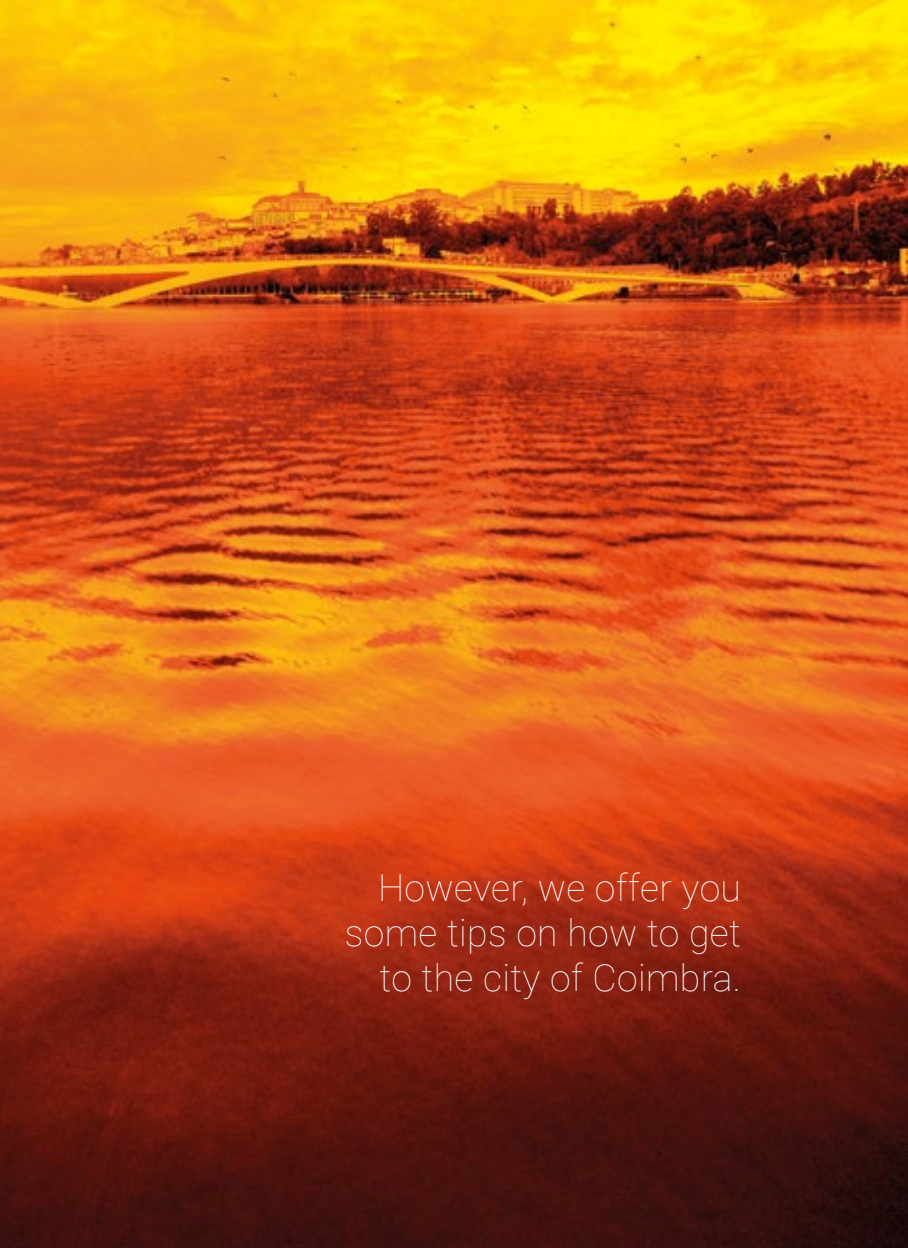
From Oporto to Coimbra and Coimbra to Oporto

Transport from/to Oporto Airport to/from the place of accommodation in Coimbra, **on the official dates of arrivals and departures of each sport**, will be organized and covered by EUG organization, bearing in mind the time of your arrival, submitted in the travel plans. This transport will be by bus from the airport to the Accreditation Center of EUG 2018 in Coimbra.

In the airport you will have a welcome desk with volunteers of the event prepared to answer all your questions, help you get your transportation and meet other needs.

From Lisbon to Coimbra and Coimbra to Lisbon

If you are coming to the EUG 2018 through an air flight that lands in Portela Airport, in Lisbon, the EUG organization will not cover your transportation to Coimbra, since it is not an official arrival and departure point of this event.



However, we offer you some tips on how to get to the city of Coimbra.

To get to Coimbra by **bus** you can catch it at Sete Rios Bus Station in Lisbon (<http://www.rede-expressos.pt/en>). To get to the station from the airport you can hop on the 731 bus (<http://www.carris.pt/en/bus/731/descendente>; if your luggage has a maximum size of 55x40x20cm) or catch the Aerobus, right outside the airport.

To get to Coimbra by **train** you can catch it at Gare do Oriente Train Station (<https://www.cp.pt/passageiros/en>). There are two main types of trains: Intercidades and Alfaretil, which differ in the length of the journey, stops along the way, comfort and price, mostly. To arrive at this station, you can either have a bus or subway trip. By bus, use the 744 one, that stops at the airport. Through the subway, there is a direct line to the train station, the red one, which is the only available at the airport. If you are travelling by train (Intercidades, Regional or Inter-Regional - these last two connect smaller cities and villages and have more stops) to Coimbra (from any other point in Portugal), you can benefit from a 30% discount on your trip. If you want and need this discount, let the Organizing Committee

know, so that we can send you a proof of enrolment in the event, that you must have to use the discount. If you don't receive this document, please contact us through transportation@eug2018.com. In Coimbra there are two train stations, you should exit in Coimbra-B. Usually the bus and train journey you are taking is part of a larger course, so it can appear on panels that the bus/train goes to a city north of Coimbra, like Oporto, Braga, among others, be aware.

Either to get to the bus or train station you may also use Taxi, Uber or Cabify.

You could also choose to have a **transfer bus arrangement** if you are part of a group of 10 people or more. For that, you will have to email bruno.martins@transdev.pt and request your private bus that will pick you up directly at the airport.

You can also arrive in Coimbra through **Coimbra Airport Shuttle**. This transportation service will pick you up from the airport (<https://coimbra.airportshuttle.pt>).

First step in Coimbra

If you are arriving at one of the stations in Coimbra (bus terminal and train station), you will also get transportation to the Accreditation Center of the event. In those stations you will have a welcome desk with volunteers prepared to answer all your questions, help you get your transportation and meet other needs.

From every city you might be coming, particularly if you are using a private way of transport, when you arrive to Coimbra you should get to our Accreditation Center, at Escola Básica 2/3 Poeta Manuel da Silva Gaio, Rua Luís Antonio Verney, Coimbra. In this location, besides all the information exchange, you will be given the credential that allows you to get to the sports venues, catering points and transportation vehicles.

If your method of transportation (airplane, bus, train, private) gets you on one of the official arrival and departure points in late hours when the Accreditation Center is closed, you will be given a temporary credential to get inside your accommodation, since you will be taken directly there.

Transportation during the EUG 2018 Coimbra

The EUG 2018 Organizing Committee Transportation Department will provide effective and timely transportation services to all accredited participants covering all key locations including accommodation, catering, EUG training and competition venues, VIP Hotel and other locations of the event.

All students and volunteers have accommodation and catering in a radius of 3 kilometres from the Main Sports Hub/sports venues.

Detailed transport timetable and lines will be displayed in Info Points, in EUG 2018 Technical Handbook of each sport, at the entrances of each accommodation, at every bus stop and at the competition/training venues, as well as at the EUG 2018 official webpage (www.eug2018.com) and mobile application. Information will be regularly updated in case of any changes in the

program. Our staff and volunteers will be at disposal in case of any questions regarding transportation at each location zones and venues load and drop-off zones.

All the transportation inside the city will be divided by sports, accommodation, catering and competition locations, as well as the frequency needed according to the timetable of the whole competition.

Additional Information

For the EUG 2018 Organizing Committee Transportation Department to give you the best possible transportation service, we recommend and ask for the travel plans to be submitted as soon as possible, including all the information correctly inserted and entirely filled.

Concerning the ceremonies, such as the opening and closing one, the transportations will be specific to those events and respecting the number of people that need to be at those locations.

There will be adapted transportation for participants with disabilities. Also, there will be designated vehicles for referees and VIP's at the event. The athletes, officials and volunteers will use the same methods of transportation provided by the Organizing Committee. EUSA Family, SCAC and Technical Delegates will be transported by car at disposal with designated driver.

If you require further information or clarifications on some of the details of the transportation written above, you can email us at transportation@eug2018.com. We highlight that you will have more detailed information in the Technical Handbook of your sport.



GENERAL MEDICAL SERVICES

Due to the scale of the event, the number of athletes and the variety of venues where the competitions will be held, the medical and security services must provide all the pre-hospital rescue process and articulation with other civil protection agents, together with the Portuguese Red Cross who will guide and perform together in order to ensure their effectiveness and the most appropriate response to each type of emergency.

In case of emergency please dial 1415.

Emergency Technicians

The event will count on 50 rescuers, with Red Cross's first aid training, accredited by INEM. They will be part of the First Aid Teams located at various points of the event as well as going to the ambulances.

Physiotherapist

The Medical Centers will have physiotherapist to start treatment at early stage all injuries.

Doctors and Nurses

The Red Cross will put Nurses and Doctors with emergency training with ALS and specific training in assistance of sporting events. These elements will be available in the two Medical Center (MC), medical ambulances, Emergency and Reanimation Medical Team. There will be medical team with doctor in high risk modalities: judo, handball, rugby and football.

Physical Resources

Operations Room will be Located in the Red Cross headquarters. The Operations Room will be the emergency management center of the event. In case of a crisis or major accident, it has the responsibility to coordinate with the Civil Protections agents and INEM, according to Portuguese current legislation, namely SIOPS.

Ambulances

During the event, there will be emergency ambulances with Basic Life Support with AED capabilities and medical ambulances with doctor and nurse with ALS capabilities. There will be two ambulances available 24h/day for the event in the Red Cross headquarters. The Medical Centers will have two ambulances during working hours. High risk sports, namely Judo, Handball, Football and Rugby will have an ambulance on the venue.

Medical Center

The Medical Centers will have a team with a sport doctor, nurse, physiotherapist and emergency technician. It will be equipped with the material needed for ALS and minor surgery. The main Medical Center will be located in the Coimbra's University Stadium, open from 9h00 to 20h00.

A second Medical Center will also be set up at CAR Montemor as it is the location farthest from the center of the city. Two ambulances will be available in each Medical Center.

Emergency and Reanimation Medical Team

Medical team in a vehicle available 24h/day located in Red Cross Headquarters.

The team has an emergency doctor and a nurse, capable to handle crisis situations with ALS capabilities during all event.

First Aid Teams

Comprised of two emergency technicians equipped with resuscitation equipment, DAE and trauma equipment, these teams will always be in close proximity to the sports arenas.

Life Boat

Life boat with 3 lifeguards for emergency situation in water. It will be always present during sport competition in the CAR of Montemor.

Insurance

The delegations shall have the appropriate insurance to cover their travel and participation in the EUG. Each participant must have an international health insurance during their stay in the EUG and must arrange this prior to their arrival at the EUG event. Neither EUSA nor OC will be liable for any costs arising from the failure to follow this regulation.

During the accreditation, each Head of Delegation will sign a declaration in which they will assume full responsibility for this matter.



ANTI-DOPING POLICY

Doping is without any doubts, the biggest threat to modern sport because it can deprive it and remove its essential values like playing fair and the respecting the opponent. Current anti-doping in competitive sports is advocated for reasons of fair-play and concern for the athlete's health. With the inception of the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA), anti-doping effort has been considerably intensified.

EUSA is active in Anti-Doping promotion, and has been a partner in the European Anti-Doping Initiative (EADIn), project aimed at establishing an European-wide Anti-Doping mentality in the youth sector by establishing a moral tenor towards concepts such as Fair-play, sensitizing and raising awareness on all levels of the complex social environment surrounding the doping problematic and implementing strategies to motivate young people to pass on the message and create a strong multiplying effect. Also, the International University Sport Federation

(FISU) has been actively promoting sports without drugs, also on university sport level.

EUSA is currently not enforcing doping tests at its events. In accordance with the national legislation of the host countries, however, doping controls may be implemented by the National Anti-Doping Agencies (ADoP). If such doping tests are executed, the WADA rules and regulations are applicable to all athletes. Please remember that testing can be conducted in-competition and out-of-competition. If you are identified in a Registered Testing Pool (RTP), you must provide current and accurate whereabouts information. The organization committee will be in strict cooperation with ADoP to provide a proper anti-doping testing during the games and will be a decisive partner in providing clarifications and implementing strategies about the doping problematic. The organizing committee will provide workshops on this matter to the sports community, before and during the EUG 2018.



The following constitute anti-doping rule violations:

- Presence of a prohibited substance in an athlete's sample
- Use or attempted use of a prohibited substance or method
- Refusing to submit sample collection after being notified
- Failure to file athlete whereabouts information and missed tests
- Tampering with any part of the doping control process
- Possession of a prohibited substance or method
- Trafficking a prohibited substance or method
- Administering or attempting to administer a prohibited substance

The list of prohibited substances and methods is updated every year by the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) and it's valid for every sport. All athletes should check every substance that they are taking. Athletes need to completely avoid steroids, erythropoietin (EPO), stimulants, human growth hormone (HGH), marijuana and narcotics, and pay special attention also to dietary or nutritional supplements. EUSA is active in Anti-Doping promotion, and has been a partner in the European Anti-Doping Initiative (EADI). Also the International University Sport Federation (FISU) has been actively promoting sports without drugs, also on university sport level.

FAIR PLAY

Fair play is deeply embedded in the values of EUSA. The objective of promotion and encouragement of Fair Play is already set in the statutes of EUSA, as part of the core objectives of the organization. Partnership with the European Fair Play Movement in 2013 proves this even more. Since 2007, EUSA announces the best gesture of fair play in its sports event for the current year and awards the winners the special fair play recognition, Enno Harms Fair Play Award, named after the first EUSA President, a person very much devoted to fair play.

At every EUSA sport event, the organizers, EUSA representatives, and technical delegates pay special attention to the fair play gestures and attitude throughout the duration of the event. By participating at an EUSA sport event, participants are thereby swearing on an oath of respect and fair play. The oath is announced to the world by the student athletes, and by the officials before the official opening of any EUSA sport event.

A first in 2017, EUSA introduced the Fair Play green card at

the European Universities Football Championship as a result of the close cooperation with the European Fair Play Movement. We are proud to see a successful introduction of this green card, which further promotes the values of Fair Play and good sportsmanship gestures on the field. As a result of these actions the people involved with the first showing of the Fair Play green card were welcomed at EUSA Gala 2018 in Madrid to collect the 2017 Enno Harms Fair Play award.

The prestigious annual EUSA Enno Harms Fair Play Award is awarded Athletes demonstrating fair play during the matches, following the rules and pursuing a “clean” game is awarded with a fair play recognition already during the event. EUSA Executive Committee members on its last meeting each year discuss the proposals received from all sporting events governed by EUSA in that year and select the team or individual to receive the Enno Harms Fair Play award which is formally handed to them at a special occasion – usually at EUSA Gala.



SAFETY AND SECURITY

Safety and Security in Coimbra

The safety and security of all the participants in the EUG 2018 is a very important issue for the Organizing committee. Coimbra has one of the lowest crime rates in Portugal according to the Annual Report of Homeland Security. Although Coimbra is a very safe and secure city, it is important to take good note of the following safety advices recommended by the OC.

All the security during the event will be the result of a strict coordination work between the Police of the Municipality of Coimbra, the Portuguese National Police and all the Civil Protection authorities.

Safety in Accommodations

Lock your room when away, even if only for a few minutes.
Do not facilitate access to strangers.
Never lend out your room or residence keys to anyone.
Inform the accommodation staff of any lock defects or lost keys.

Safety on the Street

Avoid walking alone at night in isolated areas.
Avoid carrying your original passport and important documents (make copies and carry these instead).
Do not leave laptops, books, or other valuable belongings unattended in common areas.
Be aware of your surroundings when walking outside, especially if you are listening to music on your headphones or talking on your mobile phone.
Avoid exposing cash or expensive items.
Respect pedestrian walk lights and crosswalks.

Safety on Public Transportation

If you are the only passenger in a bus, sit as close as possible to the driver. At night, be particularly careful of oncoming traffic while getting off a bus.



Non-smoking and alcohol policy

Smoking and drinking is strictly forbidden in all accommodation, sport venues, and in all the Coimbra University Stadium Headquarters.

Prohibited items

At venues

The restricted items policy applies to spectators and accredited individuals at the EUG2018. Accredited athletes and team officials will be permitted to bring items into venues that are required for specific Games-related.

Prohibited items will not be permitted into venues under any circumstances.

The list of prohibited items is as follows:

- Tents, placards, spray paint or any other item which could be used for demonstrations or sabotage within a venue;
- Large flags, banners and associated poles, large umbrellas or other items of an excessive size that may disturb the event or restrict the view;
- Laser pointers, strobe lights and similar light-emitting devices;
- Pets or animals;
- All types of knives and bladed items, including pocket knives;
- Firearms and ammunition, including replicas, component parts or any device resembling a firearm;
- Offensive weapons or implements such as flick knives and extendable batons, or anything that can be used to cause injury to another person;
- Fireworks, explosives, flares and smoke canisters;
- Toxic and dangerous materials.

EUG2018 Security reserves the right to refuse entry at its discretion of any item that appears suspicious.



Info Centre – General Help Desk

The Info Centre is located at the EUG Headquarters and will provide all general information about the games.
The Info Centre hours of operation will be from 8:00 am till 10:00 pm.
In this place, all the participants will be guided, if necessary, to the specific areas information desks:

SID - Sport Information Desk

The Sport Information Desk (SID) is located at the EUG Headquarters and will provide all the sport information throughout the Games.
The SID hours of operation - 09:00 am to 7:00 pm
The services provided at the SID are:

- Access to official results, draw/start lists and other key competition information, including schedule updates where required;
- Provision of training schedule information and, where available, assistance with booking and changing training sessions;
- Other sport-specific services.

CID - Catering Information Desk

The Catering Information Desk (CID) is located at the EUG Headquarters and will provide all the information about food and meals.
The CID hours of operation will be from 09:00 am to 7:00 pm

- The services provided at CID are:
- Information about food stations (location, schedules and menus);
- Other eating information.

AID - Accommodation Information Desk

The Accommodation information desk (AID) will be located at the EUG headquarters and will provide all the information needed during the event.
The AID hours of operation will be from 9:00 am to 7:00 pm.
The OC Accommodation Department will provide effective and appropriate accommodation service for the various categories of participants. All the accommodations will be placed near the competition areas in a 5km maximum radius.

TID - Transport Information Desk

The transport information desk (TID) will be located at the EUG headquarters and will provide all the information needed during the event.

The TID hours of operation will be from 9:00 am to 7:00 pm.

The OC Transportation Department will provide effective and appropriate transport service for the various categories of participants, covering all key locations including Accommodation, Catering, EUG Training and Competition venues, EOC and VIP Hotel and other locations.

The Ceremony will be held at the Palace of Schools of the University of Coimbra, UNESCO World Heritage Site.

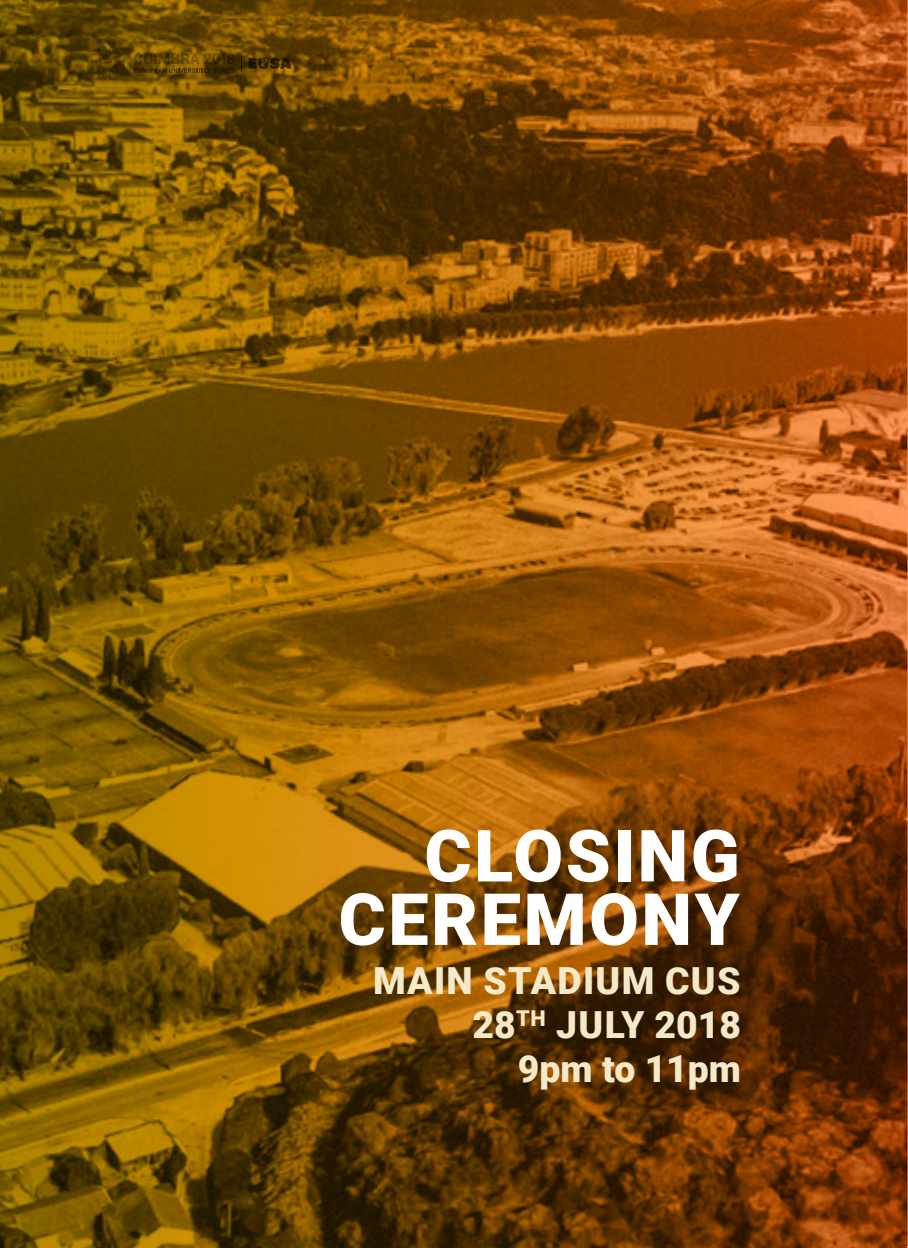

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

INTRODUCTION

GENERAL TERMS

REG 1 The EUG is organised in EUSA and Olympic spirit by which no discrimination is allowed against any country or person on grounds of race, gender, religion or political affiliation. The essence of Fair Play is highly encouraged and appreciated through-out the EUG.

REG 2 The EUSA EC will attribute the rights to host the EUG to Bidding HCP four (4) years prior to the start of the EUG, based on a written bid document. EUSA members (NUSAs) will be notified about the bidding procedure in due course.

REG 3 The EUG is organised in every even year.

REG 4 The EUG structure as well as the number of competitors/teams per country for any competition will be decided by EUSA.

REG 5 EUSA EC members, commissions members and EUSA Staff are involved in the process of preparation, execution and reporting of the EUG. For each of the EUG, the EUSA EC appoints the following EUG bodies: SVC, SCAC, competition commissions, control commission and Volunteer coordinating commission. In case the EUG is organized in more than one city, EUSA has rights to establish specific bodies, as defined in these regulations, separately for each city.

REG 6 The EUSA logotype should appear on all the publications, official documents and video materials of the OC, on the podium and on all the billboards in the competition venues, as defined in the EUSA Visual Identity.

REG 7 The EUSA official language is English, and shall be used in all kind of communications.

REG 8 The EUSA and the OC will amicable cooperate and in case of any disagreement, dispute or claim, both will make their best efforts to find a solution. In case the disputes, disagreements or claims cannot be settled by amicable means, the court of Arbitration for Sport in Lausanne (Switzerland) shall have sole jurisdiction.

REG 9 These Rules and Regulations apply to all activities of the EUG. EUSA – EUG 2018 Master Plan, Minimum Organizational Requirements, Technical Regulations, Minimum Health Care Regulations, and Guidelines for EUSA Awards are integral component of this document.

REG 10 EUSA EC is responsible for the interpretation of EUSA Regulations.

RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF EUSA AND OC

RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF EUSA

REG 11 All rights in relation to the EUG are reserved to EUSA. EUSA is the exclusive owner of all trademarks, trade name, service mark, emblem, slogan, designation of (or other indication of a relationship with) EUSA or the EUG.

REG 12 EUSA will invite the member NUSAs to participate in the EUG and publish the EUSA Regulations together with the following information: the EUG competition dates and place; entry procedure, financial conditions; maximum number of teams/competitors and contact data of the OC.

REG 13 EUSA shall receive an entry and additional (if applicable) fees from the participating NUSA / University team / Competitor.

REG 14 EUSA shall not be responsible for any claim for loss, injury or damage arising from the holding of the EUG.

REG 15 EUSA shall receive all documents, photo, audio, video and other materials from the OC, defined in EUSA Regulations.

REG 16 EUSA EC may cancel the whole EUG or one or more competitions:

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE EUROPEAN UNIVERSITIES GAMES 2018

REG 16.1 at any time in a state of war, civil disorder, boycott, embargo decreed by the international community or in a situation officially recognized as one of belligerence or if EUSA has reasonable grounds to believe that the safety of participants in the EUG would be seriously threatened or jeopardized;

REG 16.2 at any time if there is a violation by the OC of any material obligation under attribution agreement or applicable law or these regulations;

REG 16.3 up to six (6) months prior to the EUG, in case OC does not fulfil EUSA Regulations;

REG 16.4 up to three (3) months prior to the EUG if the number of registered teams/competitors is not sufficient for the regularity of this/these competition(s).

RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE ORGANIZING COMMITTEE

REG 17 The HCP may delegate its duties and obligations to an OC. The HCP shall nevertheless be directly responsible to EUSA and will report to the EUSA EC.

REG 18 The OC shall organize the EUG according to the EUSA Regulations and ISF and/or ESF regulations. All costs related to the organization (accommodation, accreditation, transportation, sports program, protocol etc.) shall be covered by the OC, and has responsibility for all registered participants in the period from their arrival to designated arrival point until their departure from designated departure points.

REG 19 The OC shall publish the contact data of the EUG office, with website and social media channels which would be operational within two (2) months after attribution of the EUG. The contact phone and email shall be handled by a person with fluent command of English.

REG 20 The OC shall ensure that all NUSA are kept fully informed of all the necessary technical and other arrangements. That includes the maintenance of an appropriate website, with recommended updates as it is determined in the EUSA – EUG 2018 Master Plan.

REG 21 The OC shall have appropriate contracts with human resources, services and material providers, owners of all venues which will work and will be used in the EUG as per dates agreed in EUSA – EUG 2018 Master Plan. The OC shall have the letter

of support from the NSF for each of the sport in the EUG program and shall establish cooperation with at least RSF for the organization of the sport competition in the EUG.

REG 22 The OC shall be responsible for insurance against all claims for loss, or damage to goods arising from the holding of the EUG. The OC shall be responsible to have appropriate insurance in case of cancelation of the EUG.

REG 23 The OC is entitled to collect a participation fee per person and per day, to get financial, material and service support from public and private sectors, under certain circumstances as defined in the EUG Attribution Agreement.

REG 24 The OC shall provide and is responsible for the following services for the accredited participants for a period of at least three (3) days prior the first (1st) day of competition and two (2) days after the closing ceremony:

REG 24.1 the accommodation agreed on by the EUSA EC on the occasion of the attribution of the EUG;

REG 24.2 the transportation for all registered/accredited participants

(competitors, officials, NUSA coordinators, referees, EUSA representatives and others) from their arrival to their departure from the designated pick-up points (in-ternational airport, bus and train station). Access to individual means of transport for the EUSA representatives shall be ensured at any time during the EUG;

REG 24.3 the sport venues, playing grounds, materials and equipment, officially recognized by the appropriate ESF/ISF and approved by the TD. The OC shall inform all teams/competitors of the type and brand of the selected equipment at least three (3) months prior to the start of the EUG;

REG 24.4 the referees and match officials for the effective running of the competitions;

REG 24.5 the accreditation cards issued by the EUSA accreditation system;

REG 24.6 a necessary and efficient information system, as per REG 20, to keep the participants duly informed of the pro- gram and the results of the EUG and other relevant information about competitions;

REG 24.7 adequate medical assistance, hygiene standards, catering, doping control (optionally, if agreed by EUSA in ad- vance), security and safety assistance, during the period of the EUG.

REG 24.8 the opening, awards and closing ceremonies;

REG 24.9 appoint the head of departments responsible for volunteers, media, IT, sports, accommodation, transportation, catering, protocol, medical, security and other organizational areas, who will cooperate with EUSA SVC and EUSA Office from the attribution of the EUG until its conclusion (when all arrangements are fulfilled). In addition OC shall appoint a person in charge of managing EUSA Result System.

REG 24.10 the sufficient number of staff, volunteers and other personnel for the smooth organization of the EUG; OC per- sonnel, who are dealing with participants and EUSA, shall speak fluently English. The OC shall participate in the EUSA volunteer program; OC provides free of charge internal transportation, accommodation and full board for a minimum of four (4) volunteers per sport.

REG 24.11 sufficient number of premises, office equipment and supplies, mobile communication system for EUSA repre- sentatives.

REG 25 The OC shall cover:

REG 25.1 the cost of travel and participation of at least two (2) OC representatives to the EUC/EUG organized before;

REG 30 SVC Members shall cooperate in a way to find compromise whenever possible. In case of voting, decisions will be taken by a majority of all present and voting. In the case of equality of votes, the SVC chair shall have a casting vote. All decisions taken by the SVC shall be implemented by the OC.

REG 31 The SVC shall regularly report the organizational progress of the EUG to the EUSA EC.

SUPERVISION, CONTROL AND ARBITRATION COMMISSION (SCAC)

REG 32 The SCAC is the highest authority of the EUG and controls overall organizational and technical aspects of the EUG. The SCAC is responsible for the interpretation of EUSA Regulations, for the supervision and smooth running of the EUG, settling any dispute, examining and dealing with any complaints or protests of a non-technical nature, taking emergency sanctions against participants (teams or individuals) who violate the EUSA Regulations, deciding of any other matters not covered in these Regulations, at the time of the EUG.

REG 33 The SCAC is composed by: SVC members, OC chair, OC Sport Director and two (2) other representatives; lead by SVC chair.

The mandate of the SCAC members terminates with the conclusion of the EUG.

REG 34 SCAC Members shall cooperate in a way to find compromise whenever possible. In case of voting, decisions will be taken by a simple majority of those present and voting. In case of equality of votes, the SCAC Chair shall have a casting vote. All decisions taken by the SCAC at the time of the EUG are final.

REG 35 The SCAC shall submit a written report to the EUSA EC after the EUG.

CONTROL COMMISSION

REG 36 The Control Commission is responsible for the accreditation of the EUG participants. They control the authenticity of the entries, the academic status of the competitors, the payment of EUSA entry fee and if necessary collect it.

REG 37 The EUSA EC appoints chair and two (2) Control Commission members for each city of the EUG, prior to the start of the EUG. The Control Commission is coordinated and supervised by SCAC. The mandate of the Control Commission members terminates with the conclusion of the EUG.

REG 25.2 the costs of travel, accommodation and full board for inspection visit of the SVC – up to five (5) members (up to three (3) times per year from attribution of the EUG on) and inspection visit (if requested only) for EUSA representatives.

REG 25.3 the costs of travel, accommodation and full board up to three (3) OC representatives at all EUSA conventions from attribution of the EUG on;

REG 25.4 the costs of travel, accommodation and full board up to three (3) OC representatives at all EUSA conferences and General Assemblies in the preceding two (2) years of the EUG;

REG 25.5 the costs of travel, accommodation and full board for OC representatives to Executive Committee meetings from attribution onwards, if requested by EUSA;

REG 25.6 the organization of EUSA EC meeting in the year of the attribution of the EUG, as well as accommodation, local transportation and full board of EUSA EC members, staff and guests (up to twenty (20) persons, 3 nights);

REG 25.6 the organization of EUSA convention as well as travel, accommodation and full board of EUSA TD, Commissions and Staff members (in addition to TDs, up to ten (10) persons, 4 nights), at latest fifteen (15) months prior to the EUG start.

REG 25.7 The costs of travel, accommodation and full board at the time of the EUG for the representatives of EUSA (SCAC, Competition, Medical, Technical, Control and Volunteers Coordinating Commission members and Staff).

REG 26 The OC shall report to the EUSA SVC on organisational progress and shall submit to EUSA Office, at its own cost all documents and materials, as it is determined in EUSA – EUG Master plan 2018.

THE EUG COMMISSIONS AND OTHER BODIES

SUPERVISION COMMISSION (SVC)

REG 27 The SVC supervises the organization of the EUG on behalf of the EUSA.

REG 28 The EUSA EC appoints the SVC members at the time of the EUG attribution. The mandate of the SVC members terminates with the beginning of the EUG.

REG 29 The SVC is composed of: up to three (3) representatives of the EC, the EUSA Secretary General and the EUSA Sports Manager. The SVC chair is the representative of the EC.

REG 38 If the official(s) of a delegation deliberately misinform(s) the control commission about the eligibility of a competitor(s), the team of the sport concerned will be excluded from further participation in the current event: such fraud could be grounds for the termination of that country's membership of EUSA.

REG 39 The control commission authorizes participation in the EUG by issuing accreditation card. If control commission refuses to authorize participation, the HOD may challenge this decision to the SCAC.

REG 40 The control commission shall regularly report to SCAC during the EUG and shall submit a written report to the EUSA Office immediately after the EUG.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE EUROPEAN UNIVERSITIES GAMES 2018

COMPETITION TECHNICAL COMMISSION (CTC)

REG 41 The CTC is responsible for: confirming the competition system (format) and daily schedule, dealing with any complaints or protests of technical nature and taking sanctions of a technical nature, appointing additional bodies and allocating responsibilities which might be required by rules of the concerned ISF/ESF or by necessities of the competition.

REG 42 The EUSA EC shall set up a CTC for each competition in the EUG program, prior to the start of the EUG. The mandate of the CTC members terminates with the conclusion of the competition.

REG 43 The CTC is composed of: the EUSA EC representative who is the chair; two (2) OC representatives, EUSA Technical Delegate and his assistant. The CTC is supervised by and reports to SCAC.

REG 44 The chair of the CTC together with SCAC representative, two (2) days prior to the start of the competition, shall convene a competition commission meeting and one (1) day prior to the start of the competition a GTM.

REG 45 CTC decisions will be taken by a simple majority of those present and voting. In case of equality of votes, the CTC chair shall have a casting vote. All decisions taken by the competition commission, when agreed with SCAC are final.

REG 46 The CTC chair shall regularly report to SCAC during the competition and shall submit a written report to the EUSA Office immediately after EUG.

THE TECHNICAL DELEGATE (TD)

REG 47 EUSA EC appoints TD and their assistant(s) for each sport in the program of the EUG.

REG 48 Prior to the start of the competition, the TD shall:

REG 48.1 maintain close cooperation with the EUSA Sports Manager and with the representative of the OC for the sport concerned,

REG 48.2 ensure that the regulations of the respective ESF/ISF, EUSA Technical Regulations and EUSA Minimum Technical Requirements are observed in the phase of preparation of the competition,

REG 48.3 inspect the sports venues, equipment and materials to be used during the competition, at the time of EUSA convention,

REG 48.4 gather exact information related to:

REG 48.4.1 the number and performance level of the participating teams and/or competitors,

REG 48.4.2 the number and qualification of the referees and match officials provided by OC and/or proposed by participating teams,

REG 48.4.3 the number and quality of sports equipment and materials, play grounds and sports venues,

REG 48.5 devise a system for the appointment of referees and other match officials,

REG 48.6 determine the provisional competition system (format) and schedule,

REG 48.7 together with the OC representative, prepare the Technical Handbook of the competition at least one (1) month prior to the EUG for SVC authorization,

REG 48.8 prepare PowerPoint presentation at least one (1) week before the GTM for SVC authorization.

REG 49 One (1) day prior to the start of the competition, the TD shall convene a technical meeting to which he shall invite: his assistant, EUSA Sports Manager, appointed referees, referee observers (if nominated), OC responsible for sport and match officials (if needed).

REG 50 TD shall actively participate in the GTM by presenting the Technical Regulations and together with the SCAC representative by making a draw according to Technical Regulations.

REG 51 During the competition, the TD shall:

REG 51.1 maintain close cooperation with the SCAC representative and members of competition commission,

REG 51.2 assign duties to his assistant,

REG 51.3 manage the competition in accordance with the EUSA and ESF/ISF regulations,

REG 51.4 manage and appoint referees and match officials for the competition,

REG 51.5 treat and solve technical protests and technical issues,

REG 51.6 confirm results of matches and final teams/competitors standings,

REG 51.7 participate in the Opening and closing ceremony (if it is in the period of competition), and actively participate in the Awards ceremony.

REG 52 The TD shall regularly report to SCAC, and shall submit a written report to the EUSA Office immediately after the inspection visit and after the EUG (including any nomination for Fair Play Award).

REG 53 The TD shall observe, follow and respect "Technical Delegate – Rights, Duties and Responsibilities" document and EUSA Regulations.

VOLUNTEERS COORDINATING COMMISSION (VCC)

REG 54 The Volunteers Coordinating Commission cooperates with the OC Volunteer Department, assisting in international volunteers management and supervising organizational activities of the OC on volunteers' area.

REG 55 The Volunteers coordinating commission is composed of five (5) members. Three (3) are appointed by the EUSA EC and two by the OC Volunteer Department. The Volunteers Coordinating Commission is coordinated by EUSA Communications Manager and supervised by SCAC. The mandate of the Volunteers Coordinating Commission members terminates with the conclusion of the EUG.

REG 56 All decisions taken by the Volunteers Coordinating Commission, when agreed with SCAC are final.

REG 57 The Volunteers coordinating commission shall regularly report to SCAC, and shall submit a written report to the EUSA Office immediately after the EUG.

EUG PARTICIPANTS

ELIGIBILITY

REG 58 Participants should be nominated through their NUSA. If no team/competitor is nominated by a NUSA in the defined term, EUSA may accept an entry directly from a University, but is obliged to inform the respective NUSA. Non-members of EUSA may enter via a reserve list; a higher fee might be imposed.

REG 59 Only the following may participate as competitors:

REG 59.1 students who are officially registered for and pursuing a course of study at a university or similar institute whose status as an

institution of higher education is recognised by the appropriate national authority of their country;

a student shall confirm his status with completed, signed and sealed EUSA certificate of Academic Eligibility (Individual Entry).

REG 59.2 former students of the institutions mentioned above who obtained their academic degree or diploma in the academic year preceding the EUG.

REG 59.3 competitors shall not be younger than 17 and older than 30 years (by formula: the EUG Year – competitor's year of birth = age);

REG 60 If the official(s) of a delegation deliberately misinform the SCAC Chair about the eligibility of a competitor(s), the participant and the team of the sport concerned will be excluded from further participation in the current event: such fraud may give grounds for the termination of that country's membership of EUSA.

COMPETING UNIVERSITIES

REG 61 Participants of the EUC are Universities and similar institutions with status of an institution of higher education recognised by an appropriate national authority of their country.

REG 62 The members (competitors and officials) of each university form a delegation. The integration of more universities of the same city is permitted only exceptionally within the institutional designation of the given NUSA national championship structure and such a team officially represents only one university.

REG 63 The participating universities shall use their own name in English only. The country name may be used in addition, and should be used in accordance with the name and abbreviation, as recognised by FISU. If the use of the name of a University is not possible due to technical reasons, then the abbreviation shall be used in every single document.

REG 64 The composition of a delegation is defined in the Technical Regulations of the respective sport. If a delegation brings more officials than defined, the OC needs to authorise such a request in advance and may ask for an increased participation fee (at maximum double amount of the participation fee), which should be published in the official invitation. Delegation cannot include more competitors as determined in the Technical Regulations.

REG 65 All financial responsibilities and obligations are borne by NUSA regardless of who in fact might pay (NUSA, university, third parties). The NUSA or University shall pay an entry fee to EUSA, a participation fee to the OC and additional fees, if applicable.

REG 66 Each delegation shall designate a HOD who alone shall be

entitled to represent his delegation, unless otherwise provided in EUSA Regulations or agreed with the competition commission. The HOD cannot be at the same time registered as competitor in the following sports: Basketball, Handball, Football, Futsal, Rugby 7s and Volleyball.

REG 67 The delegations shall be responsible for their travel cost to the designated arrival/departure pick-up points.

REG 68 The delegations shall have the appropriate insurance to cover their travel and participation in the EUG. The delegation shall be responsible to provide international health insurance for all its members.

REG 69 The delegations shall bring two (2) flags (dimension 1x2 metres) of their University to the OC during the GTM and shall send the logotype of their university to the EUSA Office with the quantitative entry form and to the OC after being confirmed as participant.

REG 70 The NUSA which directly represents the university teams from its country is entitled to participate in the EUG with its delegation, by maximum of three percent (3%) of all their participants. NUSA is entitled to claim its own office and its own room for their medical treatment from OC, if its delegation consists of more than one hundred (100) participants.

REG 71 Teams / competitors from countries who had withdrawn their participation in the previous years would be considered at a lower priority. The EUSA EC might impose additional deposits for such teams.

REG 72 The HOD or authorised by him representative of team may protest on behalf of competitors or team. Each protest shall be accompanied by a deposit of fifty (50) EUR except for the following sports: Basketball, Handball, Football, Futsal, Rugby 7s and Volleyball where the deposit is two hundred (200) EUR. If the protest is upheld, the fee will be returned. The protests shall be submitted:

REG 72.1 within twenty (20) minutes after the end of the match to the TD for the match issues,

REG 72.2 before the start of next competition day on published results to the TD for the published issues,

REG 72.3 during the competition to the competition commission for technical issues,

REG 72.4 during the competition to the SCAC for non-technical issues,

REG 72.5 within seven (7) days after the EUG to the EUSA EC for the EUG issues.

PARTICIPANTS' ACCREDITATION CARDS

REG 73 EUSA collects participant's data: name, address, residence,

location, date and place of birth, nationality, passport number, gender, university, faculty and year of study, phone number and email address. The processing of these personal data is governed by the Swiss Federal Data Protection Act of 1992 (DPA). Collected individual entries in hard copies shall be destroyed fourteen (14) days after the EUG, in case there is no protest submitted.

REG 74 A numbered accreditation card with a recently taken photograph will be issued to each competitor whose dossier has been approved by the control commission. An accreditation card will be issued also to all EUSA representatives, referees, VIP guests, security and medical staff, journalists, volunteers, OC members, teams' officials and all other involved participants in the EUG. When the accreditation card is issued, participant cannot change his status in the EUG (i.e. from competitor to official and vice versa). Electronic data are kept in EUSA online registration system, access to which is limited.

REG 75 Participants may access to all venues and may use services only with the accreditation card.

REG 76 A duplicate of the lost accreditation card may be produced upon HOD request. The duplicate accreditation card is chargeable in the maximum amount of the participation fee for remaining days. The amount shall be communicated by the OC to participants at latest during the GTM.

REG 77 Accreditation procedure starts two (2) days before each competition. Competitors cannot be accredited after the GTM.

REG 78 Competitors are obliged to show the accreditation card to the official in charge of the match who allowed them to compete.

REG 79 If a person, who has been refused a competitor's accreditation card, attempts to compete by means of fraud, he will be excluded from the EUG. Should this fraud be attempted in a team competition, the team may also be excluded from the competition and any earlier results in the current competition will be annulled. A report will be forwarded to the respective NUSA and university. EUSA EC will, further on, examine each case individually, sanctions for NUSA or/and university or/and individuals concerned may be imposed.

ENTRY PROCEDURE

DEADLINES

REG 80 Invitation to the EUG is published on EUSA website and sent to NUSAs normally nine (9) months prior to the start of the EUG.

REG 81 The deadlines for general, quantitative, referee and individual entries, competitors' match uniforms in general would be normally on

fifteen of the month prior the EUG, as follows:

REG 81.1 general entry – first call deadline: 6 months

REG 81.2 general entry – second call deadline: 5 months

REG 81.3 general entry – third call deadline: 4 months

REG 81.4 quantitative entry: 3 months

REG 81.5 referee entry form: 2 months

REG 81.6 individual entry forms: 1 month

REG 81.7 travel plan: 1 month

REG 81.8 team/individual international and national ranking, competitors' match uniforms (shirt, shorts and socks) colours: 1 month (where applicable)

REG 81.9 deadlines above could be shortened/extended under certain circumstances.

ENTRIES SUBMISSION

REG 82 The NUSA is responsible for the submission of all entries. Entry forms shall be submitted according to the procedure laid down in paragraph Entry Procedure. It is recommended that NUSA verifies the status of the competitors from their universities.

REG 83 The general, quantitative, referee and individual entries shall be submitted via the EUSA online registration system:

REG 83.1 the general entry submission shall be done by NUSA or by EUSA as defined in REG 58.

REG 83.2 the quantitative, referee and individual entries submission shall be done by university team contact person.

REG 84 Only general entries with deposits paid within the defined deadlines will be considered. The general entries are validated by the EUSA Office.

REG 85 Quantitative entry will be considered only if the composition of the delegation is in the agreement with the Technical Regulations and arrival and departure days reflect the official competition arrival and departure days. If confirmed university does not submit the Quantitative entry within the deadline, participation fee for full period for the maximum allowed number of competitors and officials as determined in the Technical Regulation of the sport concerned will have to be paid.

REG 86 The NUSA may nominate more than one (1) team in each sport of the EUG program. If more than one team is nominated, the nomination shall define a NUSA ranking order to enable seeding. It is highly recommended to nominate teams from previous national

universities championship year.

NUMBER OF PARTICIPATING TEAMS

REG 87 Only one NUSA team will be considered at the first call deadline of the general entry, namely the team being the winner of national championship. In case this is not possible, the teams with the next national ranking may participate.

REG 88 In case the allowed maximum number of teams is not reached within the general entry – first call deadline, the second call of the general entry is observed, where the second team nominated by NUSA can be accepted, by criterion "first pay-first serve".

REG 89 If general entry – second call is open, winner of previous year event (EUC) has special rights ("wild card") to enter the competition in the corresponding sport.

REG 90 In case the allowed maximum number of teams is not reached within the general entry – second call deadline, the third call of the general entry is observed, where the third, fourth and/or fifth team and/or second team from the same university nominated by NUSA can be accepted, on the criterion "first pay-first serve" and by respecting the maximum allowed number of teams in the EUG from the same NUSA, as follows:

REG 90.1 up to 8 teams – maximum 2 teams from the same NUSA

REG 90.2 from 9 up to 12 teams – maximum 3 teams from the same NUSA

REG 90.3 from 13 up to 16 teams – maximum 4 teams from the same NUSA

REG 90.4 17 and more teams – maximum 5 teams from the same NUSA

REG 90.5 the host team and winner of previous year competition (REG 87) do not count in the NUSA quota

REG 90.6 REG 90.1-REG 90.5 do not apply to: 3x3 Basketball, Judo, Rugby 7s, and new team competitions in the first five editions/years (counting together EUC and EUG) in which more teams/ competitors per NUSA can participate, according to the respective Technical Regulations.

REG 91 In case after the first call deadline of the general entry, the maximum allowed number of teams in Badminton, Basketball, 3x3 Basketball, Football, Futsal, Handball, Rugby 7s, Table Tennis, Tennis and Volleyball is exceeded, the maximum number may be raised by factor 2 or 4, in agreement with the OC, as follows: from 8 to 10, from 10 to 12, from 12 to 16 and all next by factor 4. If such enlargement is applied, and if needed, the competition may be extended by one (1) day, in prior agreement with the OC.

REG 92 In case after the second call deadline of the general entry, the maximum allowed number of teams in Badminton, Basketball, 3x3

Basketball, Football, Futsal, Handball, Rugby 7s, Table Tennis, Tennis and Volleyball cannot be reached, the maximum number of teams will be lowered by factor 4 or 2, as follows: from 24 to 20, from 20 to 16, from 16 to 12, from 12 to 10 and from 10 to 8.

REG 93 The maximum number of teams in the EUG is approved by EUSA Office.

PARTICIPANTS DOSSIER

REG 94 The delegation dossier to be presented to the control commission shall be completed in English and shall include:

REG 94.1 team list with names, surnames and functions of each delegation member; in addition: team/competitor international and national ranking, competitors shirt number and competition uniforms colour (if required by Technical Regulations),

REG 94.2 HOD or team representative and coach (if present) mobile phone number on which is/are reachable 24 hours per day during the competition,

REG 94.3 signed EUSA Participants Code of Ethics.

REG 94.4 the individual dossier for each competitor.

REG 95 The individual dossier for each competitor to be presented to the Control Commission shall be completed in English and include:

REG 95.1 a passport or national identity card (in classic Latin alphabet letters);

REG 95.2 if a current student: the EUSA certificate of Academic Eligibility (Individual Entry) originating from the appropriate academic authority certifying that the competitor is officially registered for and pursuing a course of study;

REG 95.3 if a former student: proof by the University and date of graduation.

FINANCIAL CONDITIONS

THE BIDDING COMMITTEE

REG 96 Bidding fee – EUSA shall receive a bidding fee from Bidding HCP. The deadlines will be decided by EUSA EC for each call. Bidding fee is non-refundable.

THE ORGANIZING COMMITTEE

REG 97 EUSA service fee – EUSA shall receive from the HCP the attribution fee and activity fee. Attribution fee shall be paid within one (1) month after attribution, while Activity fee – within one (1) month after the conclusion of the EUG.

REG 98 Guarantee fee – in order to assure that all financial and organizational arrangements described in EUSA Regulations are fulfilled, EUSA shall receive a guarantee fee from the OC. The guarantee fee will be deducted from the deposits paid by participating teams to EUSA, in the amount of 10% of all collected deposits. The guarantee fee will be transferred to the OC immediately after the end of the EUG, when all arrangements are fulfilled.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE EUROPEAN UNIVERSITIES GAMES 2018

PARTICIPANTS

REG 99 Deposit – EUSA shall receive a deposit together with the general entry form according to the general entries procedure, where applicable. Only general entries with deposits paid within the defined deadlines will be considered. The general entry deposits will be deducted from the total fees for the participating teams, and will be returned to those NUSA s/teams not selected (confirmed). In case of a forfeit/ withdrawal after being confirmed, the deposit is non-refundable and is equally shared between EUSA and the OC. EUSA will transfer the deposit in the due time, e.g. after the end of the event when the OC obligations are fulfilled.

REG 100 Participation fee – the OC will receive a participation fee per person per night for each member of the delegation (referees are exempt from payment). The participation fee shall be paid by each participant for the duration of the competition.

Participation fee covers the following services: internal transportation, accommodation, catering, competition, ceremonies and other services in accordance with EUSA Regulations. 50% of the total sum of the participation fee, without considering general entry deposit, shall be paid until the quantitative entry deadline, and the balance of the participation latest by the individual entry deadline.

REG 101 Entry fee – EUSA shall receive an entry fee from competitors, officials, NUSA representatives and other participants (refer-ees are exempt from payment). The entry fee deadlines will be decided by EUSA EC. Only quantitative entries with entry fee paid within the defined deadlines will be considered (for individual sports – Judo, Rowing, EUSA Entry Fee is paid at registration). In case of a forfeit/withdrawal after being confirmed and in case fewer delegation members participate in the competition, the entry fee is non-refundable.

MISCELLANEOUS

REG 102 All fees are determined by the EUSA EC not later than the date of attribution of the EUG.

REG 103 EUSA EC has the right to introduce additional fees.

REG 104 All payments shall be received in Euro currency (EUR) without any local or international bank transfer fees, with the exception of the host teams in regards to their payments to the HCP and the OC.

REG 105 If the whole EUG, or one or more competitions are cancelled.

REG 105.1 the deposits, the participation fees and the entry fees are refunded.

REG 105.2 the attribution fee is not refundable.

ARCHIVES OF THE EUG DOCUMENTS

REG 106 From EUG 2012 on, EUSA Office keeps archives of the electronic documents of the EUG, as follow:

REG 106.1 competition results and statistics,

REG 106.2 general, quantitative, referee and individual entries (database in the EUSA online registration system).

REG 107 Dealing with the documents should be according to the laws of the country, where the documents are kept. Accessibility to the documents is possible through request to the EUSA Office. If the request is justifiable, the applicant will get the requested information in an official letter or email. Originals and copies of the documents cannot be distributed to anyone.

reg 108 The archived EUG documents, may be destroyed if EUSA EC agrees.

DISCIPLINARY PROTOCOL

DSC 1 INTRODUCTION

DSC 1.1 EUSA strongly promotes excellent behaviour and self-conduct, which are regularly associated with students, and encourages students from across Europe to get to know each other, develop a greater understanding of each other's culture and to enjoy fair and competitive sport. EUSA sees those values as cornerstones of the universities sport.

DSC 1.2 All EUSA events should be enjoyed by all participants, as is reflected in the oath of the competitors and officials and every participant (athlete, official, and spectator) within the institution have a responsibility to conduct themselves and should appreciate that different individuals have different levels of tolerance in regards to playful and boisterous behaviour.

DSC 1.3 All competitors, officials and spectators seek at all EUSA events, to perform to the best of their ability and to respect others, including diversity, fan culture, inclusion and health together with the aim of treating everyone equitably and sensitively, within the context of their activity and ability, regardless of gender, ethnic origin, cultural background, sexual orientation, religion or political affiliation.

DSC 1.4 In addition to DSC 1.3, zero tolerance policy against promoting incitement on racial, national, ethnic, gender, language, religion, political or other grounds for hatred, violence, intolerance or insults of one's dignity will be enforced.

DSC 1.5 Any Participating team or individual, after being confirmed by the draw, shall participate in all scheduled matches.

DSC 2 BREACHES OF DISCIPLINE DURING THE COMPETITION

DSC 2.1 Breaches of discipline during the competition are all and every disciplinary incidents on the field of play, within the rules as set out by the governing body for that sport.

The following sanctions may apply in EUSA events:

DSC 2.2 Normally, the match officials deal with the breaches of discipline during competition, based on the rules as set out by the governing body for that sport.

DSC 3 BREACHES OF DISCIPLINE OUT OF THE COMPETITION

DSC 3.1 Breaches of discipline during out of the competition are, as follows:

Not participating in all scheduled matches

Any act of violence, threatening, abusive, obscene or provocative behaviour, conduct or language

Any behaviour against rights, dignity and worth of every human being and their ultimate right to self-determination, such as but not limited to, treating others unequally based on their gender, ethnic origin, cultural background, sexual orientation, religion or political affiliation

Leaving the event earlier than required by the official dates

Any damage of property whatsoever

Any use of alcohol and drugs

Any kind of sexual abuse

Any kind of match fixing whatsoever

Any other form of acting opposite to the EUSA values as set in DSC 1.1. and this Rules and Regulations.

DSC 4 THE DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURE

DSC 4.1 Anyone can report breach of discipline to SCAC.

DSC 4.2 SCAC must decide in 24 hours from the report of the breach of conduct and must compose a written report, using enclosed form, in the following cases:

If there was a hearing

If a sanction, as set in DSC 5.1, was enforced;

DSC 4.3 SCAC will make an internal notification to the person who reported breach of discipline, explaining only briefly if the disciplinary procedure has been taken or not.

DSC 4.4 SCAC must organize a hearing if it wants to enforce a sanction as set in DSC 5.1. If an individual or a representative (team) refuses to participate in a hearing SCAC may decide without their participation.

DSC 4.5 SCAC is obliged to send a written report containing all disciplinary issues, with all individual reports (hearings, actions) attached, to the EUSA Office within 15 (fifteen) days after the event termination.

DSC 5 SANCTIONS

DSC 5.1 SCAC may apply the following sanctions:

Oral and/or written warning

Temporary or permanent ban from the competition; in the case

of latter individual/delegation will be banned from the remainder of the competition and leave the event (non-refundable), in which case an individual/delegation will be expected to leave the athlete accommodation site at the earliest possible opportunity, as agreed with the SCAC

Fine up to of 500 EUR for an individual

Fine up to 2000 EUR for the delegation;

Written report to the rector of that University and to the NUSA setting out the reasons for the action taken

DSC 5.2 Sanctions set in DSC 3.5 may be cumulated.

DSC 5.3 In the case of any breaches of law and/or legislation of the host country whatsoever SCAC is obliged to report the aforementioned breach to the local authorities.

DSC 5.4 Sanctions as set in DSC 5.1 may apply for the breaches of discipline done during the competition if they are done during the competition and if the nature of the breach goes beyond the one defined by the rules set out by the governing body for that sport.

DSC 5.5 In extreme and/or recidivist cases the EUSA EC may ban the University from particular or all EUSA events for a certain period.

DSC 5.6 In all cases, the EUSA EC reserves the right to give further consideration to all disciplinary issues and impose additional penalties if appropriate.

DSC 5.7 In case where the University fails to pay a fine it will not have the right to participate in EUSA events until the fine has been received by the EUSA.

DSC 5.8 Where the University is involved in damage to property at a EUSA event, compensation for damage will be sought by the OC, with the support of EUSA and the NUSA. This compensation in not whatsoever related from the fines set in 5.1.c and /or 5.1.d. In extreme circumstances EUSA EC reserves the right to fine institutions or impose a ban from future events until the issue is resolved.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE EUROPEAN UNIVERSITIES GAMES 2018

DSC 6 SUPPORTERS

DSC 6.1 In circumstances where the supporters of a University are behaving in an unacceptable manner in the view of the OC, the OC may remove the supporters from all venues associated with the event. The OC will encourage University delegation to, in all possible manner whatsoever, influence their supporters to act in an acceptable manner.

DSC 7 APPEAL

DSC 7.1 Each year, based on reports submitted to the EUSA Office, as set in DSC 4.4, the EUSA Office will generate a General Disciplinary Report, in order to monitor standards of behavior and severity of sanctions.

DSC 7.2 In all circumstances, Universities on whom sanctions have been imposed may appeal to the EUSA EC within 30 (thirty) days following the day they were given the notice in matter. A fee of 300 EUR must be paid at the time of the appeal, which will be refunded if the appeal is successful. Any expenses relating to the appeal (e.g. – attendance at the appeal procedure by the appellant) will be covered by the University.

MEDICAL REGULATIONS

MED 1 All participants in EUG participate at their own risk.

MED 2 Each participant requires international health insurance for the duration of the stay in the EUG and must arrange this prior to their arrival at the EUG event. Neither EUSA nor OC will be liable for any costs arising from the failure to follow this regulation.

MED 3 Each participant with special dietary requirement or with a chronic condition/ illness shall communicate all relevant information to the OC in advance, and at the latest during accreditation procedure.

MED 4 Person with contagious disease cannot be accredited and cannot take part in the EUG.

MED 5 People with disabilities shall communicate the following information to the OC in advance:

MED 5.1 the contact details of their personal assistant (where applicable)

MED 5.2 if they are traveling with personal service animal;

MED 5.3 the nature of any special services required;

MED 5.4 their most recent classification for the sport in which they are participating (only for athletes).

DOPING CONTROL

MED 6 EUSA is committed to the principles of fair play and upholds the principles of antidoping at all of its events.

MED 7 The GTM will include information about expectations in regards to antidoping matters

MED 8 Where it occurs and where present at EUG, the MC is responsible for ensuring that WADA Regulations on antidoping procedures are adhered to.

MED 9 Any competitor found to test positive on doping control procedure will be excluded from all future EUSA events for the period of (2) years. In such circumstances a report will be submitted to WADA, ISF, to the rector of his University, National University Sport Association and National Sport Federation. EUSA EC may impose additional sanctions.

PROTOCOL/AWARD CEREMONIES

PRO 1 Medal winners or exceptionally their representatives must attend the Awards ceremony. The ceremony will be postponed if none of the medal winners can attend (i.e. the athletes themselves and not their representatives).

PRO 2 The athletes are not allowed to wear or bring on the podium any national, political, cultural or religious symbols or slogans, and/or play such audio/video material.

PRO 3 Athletes are expected to take off their caps when receiving their medal and hold them in their hand throughout the ceremony.

PRO 4 All medallists must remain at the disposal of the media after the Awards ceremony for cameramen, photographs and interviews.

PRO 5 A certificate of participation must be prepared for each athlete,

official and volunteer, and handed to the Head of Delegation of each delegation for distribution, at the last day before final competition day. The EUSA Office should approve it at least three (3) months before the opening of the event.

TECHNICAL REGULATIONS

GENERAL SPORT RULES

GSR 1 The technical part of the EUSA competitions is organized on the basis of the most recent published version of EUSA Regulations, ISF and/or ESF Regulations of respective sport and with the Technical Handbook of the competition. In case of any dispute, EUSA Regulations shall always be considered first.

GSR 2 Official competition days are:

GSR 2.1 day 1: teams arrivals, accreditation procedure, training sessions
gsr 2.2 day 2: accreditation procedure, the GTM and training sessions
gsr 2.3 day 3-10: competition, training session, Awards ceremony

GSR 2.4 day after the last Awards ceremony: teams' departure

Duration of the competition shall be in accordance with the Technical Regulations of respective sport. competition may include a rest day.

GSR 3 In the team competitions, there are normally two (2) stages; the first stage (playing in groups, round robin system) and the second stage (play-off format, single or double elimination system), set according to the respective sports regulations. Last group matches of the first stage, shall be played at the same time, whenever possible.

GSR 4 The University team of the host city or in its absence the host country's highest ranked team will be placed on first (1) place in group A (A1).

GSR 5 Matches cannot start earlier than 9.30 and the last match of the day cannot start later than 21.00, if not agreed differently with SCAC or SVC in advance.

GSR 6 In case weather conditions impede the competition, it is up to SCAC and head referee to decide on further running/schedule of the competition.

GSR 7 Competition system (format) shall be prepared in such a way, that competition concludes with matches for all final places (i.e. 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th, 11th, 13th, 15th etc.). Taking part in conciliation tournament is compulsory. For individual competitions, if the matches

for all final places are not organized due to the nature of a sport discipline, the final ranking which determines each place shall be nevertheless prepared.

GSR 8 The matches for the bronze and gold medals shall always be played as the last, no other matches shall be played at this time. These 2 (two) matches shall be played in the late afternoon or evening. The gold medal match shall be the last match of the EUC.

GSR 9 Playing surface, equipment and materials shall meet ISF standards. Wherever possible, playing surface, equipment, material and conditions shall be the same during the whole competition of respective sport for all involved teams or competitors.

GSR 10 OC shall provide the necessary equipment/materials for results processing, competition and match managing using EUSA software where applicable.

REFEREES AND MATCH OFFICIALS

REF 1 Referees with an international license issued by ISF or at least with the highest national licence issued by NSF are entitled to be involved in EUSA competitions. Match officials with enough experience in national competitions are entitled to be involved in EUSA competitions.

REF 2 Referees shall respect EUSA competition Referee code of Ethics. Referees officiate matches in accordance with: ISF/ESF rules and regulations; their knowledge and experiences; their best capability and performance. Protests on referee decisions are not allowed, if it is not regulated differently in the ESF/ISF Regulations of the respective sport.

REF 3 Sufficient numbers of referees and match officials shall be provided by the OC, if this is not regulated differently in the Technical Regulations. In such cases:

REF 3.1 If a participating team must include in its delegation a referee at its own cost, and it fails to fulfil this obligation, it must pay a penalty fee (defined in the Technical Regulations of respective sport) to the OC. Referees nominated by the participating teams corresponding to the required level would be integrated at the same conditions as the domestic referees;

REF 3.2 If there is no obligation to include a referee in participating team delegation, the team may bring a referee at its own cost, only if it is allowed by the Technical Regulations.

REF 3.3 EUSA has right to appoint referees directly; in this case,

participating teams will be charged the refereeing fee, defined by EUSA.

REF 4 The TD of the respective sport confirms the referees list based on licenses issued by ISF or NSF and submitted two (2) months prior to the competition by the OC.

REF 5 The OC shall provide a referee attaché (or coordinator), preferable from the NSF, for each sport of the program.

REF 6 Accommodation, transportation, catering and other necessary services for referees shall be provided without any charge and are defined in the Minimum Organizational Requirements.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE EUROPEAN UNIVERSITIES GAMES 2018

REF 7 EUSA does not provide any daily allowances fees for any referee and sport / competition official. Teams and OC may have different arrangements with the referees involved.

REF 8 In the competition where referees come from different countries, whenever possible:

REF 8.1 referees should not officiate the match where the team from their country is playing,

REF 8.2 referees from the same country should not constitute the majority, officiating the match.

REF 9 Referees shall bring their own official uniforms and wear it during the matches, if not approved differently by TD or defined differently in Technical Regulations of the respective sport. Uniform colours to be used are decided by TD.

REF 10 Referees and match officials are appointed by TD for each match. Appointments shall be published in official bulletin of the competition and on official competition website before the match/competition kick-off.

REF 11 TD may exclude referees and match officials from the competition, if they:

REF 11.1 do not officiate in accordance: with the ISF Laws of the Game and EUSA Regulations,

REF 11.2 do not officiate in the Fair Play Spirit,

REF 11.3 do not respect EUSA competition Referee code of Ethics,

REF 11.4 refuse to officiate the match, for which they are appointed,

REF 11.5 do not participate actively in all formal competition activities organized for referees,

REF 11.6 support publicly one of the teams / athletes during competition,

REF 11.7 their behaviour, health and/or physical condition are not acceptable.

REF 12 Referee shall receive on a proposal of TD a Letter of Recognition to be delivered before the end of the competition.

REF 13 Referees should take part in the referee meetings, GTM, Opening and closing ceremony (if ceremonies are in the program during the competition). First referee meeting shall take place on the day of GTM.

COMPETITORS EQUIPMENT AND UNIFORMS

CEU 1 Competitors shall wear equipment and uniforms in accordance with ISF/ESF rules. Competitor, who violates these rules, can be refused to play or expelled from the match. The team of a competitor whose official match uniform contains political, religious or personal slogans or statements will be sanctioned in accordance with EUSA Disciplinary Protocol.

CEU 2 The jersey of the competitor shall contain the name of the university and optionally the name of the competitor; no other name can be used. Names on jersey shall be written in Latin letters. The country flag may be used on uniform only in case the name of university appears too. Sponsors logotype may appear on equipment and uniforms of the competitor in accordance with the ISF rules.

CEU 3 Where the use of competitor playing number is required, the competitor shall use the same number during the whole competition.

TECHNICAL HANDBOOK

THB 1 Technical Handbook shall include all relevant information about services for competition participants provided by OC. Sport rules and regulations, training & competition schedule and other important technical information shall be described in details.

THB 2 Technical Handbook is prepared by OC and TD at least one (1) month before the competition, and is approved by EUSA SVC.

THB 3 Changes to definitions published in the Technical Handbook are not allowed after the GTM.

THB 4 TD is responsible for the interpretation of the technical part of the Technical Handbook.

THB 5 GTM participants shall get a hard copy of Technical Handbook, which shall be distributed to them during the GTM at the lat- est. The electronic version of Technical Handbook shall be published on the EUG official website.

THB 6 Technical Handbook in electronic copy is kept in EUSA Archive.

GENERAL TECHNICAL MEETING

TME 1 The GTM is a mandatory part of competition.

TME 2 The GTM shall be organized inside building in a large and representative room equipped with audio and video system.

TME 3 The GTM is called by the CTC chair together with SCAC representative, one (1) day prior to the start of the competition.

Invited are: the SCAC, the competition commission, the NSF/ESF/ISF representative (if nominated), the OC representatives, the Heads of Delegations (maximum two (2) persons per delegation), the NUSAs coordinators (if present), referees and other guests.

TME 4 The GTM, after the welcome message of competition commission chair, is divided in three parts:

TME 4.1 First Part: organizational part of the EUG, presented by the OC representative,

TME 4.2 Second Part: technical part of the competition, presented by the TD,

TME 4.3 Third Part: the draw of the competition (optionally, if required by the competition format), carried out by the TD and EUSA Sport Manager.

TME 5 The team representatives may ask questions about all aspects of the competition, if times allows.

TME 6 The GTM shall not exceed one (1) hour.

THE DRAW PROCEDURE

DRP 1 The draw procedure shall be:

DRP 1.1 in agreement with the competition system (format),

DRP 1.2 explained to the GTM audience,

DRP 1.3 carried out in front of the team representatives.

DRP 3 Names of the participating teams can be put in the “non-transparent balls” in advance. The opening of the balls shall be done transparently, showing to the audience who is drawn.

DRP 4 The draw procedure cannot be repeated, unless a mistake is done, and this is approved by the TD and SCAC Representative.

DRP 5 The results of the draw shall be delivered to participating teams immediately after the GTM.

EUSA RANKING LIST

ERL 1 The EUSA Ranking list is used to define the pools for the draw of the first stage of competition.

ERL 2 EUSA Ranking List is made, as follows:

Number of participating TEAMS

ERL 2.1 the points are attributed to the teams based on the final standing of the competition; only one, the highest placed team of the NUSA, gets the points. Accumulated points are calculated for NUSA.

ERL 2.2 Points are delivered as follows:

ERL 2.3 Points accumulated within the last four (4) years determine the EUSA Ranking List, published annually by the EUSA Office.

ERL 3 EUSA Ranking List is used in all EUSA team competitions. In case of additional international ranking lists (ISF and/or ESF) are considered by EUSA Technical Regulations of the respective sport, the EUSA Ranking List shall be always considered first.

Only the latest published international ranking list of ISF and/or ESF may be considered and presented during the GTM.

MATCH RESULTS

MTR 1 Each match finishes with the result, announced by referee or match official.

MTR 2 Results are published on official competition website and social media immediately after the match by the OC. They have unofficial status.

MTR 3 Results became official after TD confirmation, and are published in the official competition bulletin available breakfast time of the following day.

MTR 4 HoD or an authorised representative of a team may file protest on published results to the TD:

MTR 4.1 within twenty (20) minutes after the end of the match on match result,

MTR 4.2 before the start of next competition day on published result.

Each protest shall be accompanied by a deposit of fifty (50) EUR except for the following sports: Basketball, Handball, Football, Futsal, Rugby 7s and Volleyball where the deposit is two hundred (200) EUR. If the protest is upheld, the fee will be returned. competition commission deal with the protest and its decision is final.

MTR 5 Competition results in electronic version are kept in EUSA Archive.

AWARDS AND TITLES

AWA 1 EUSA presents awards to the winners during the Awards ceremony.

AWA 2 The winners of competitions, normally first three top ranked teams / competitors, will get cups, medals and other awards as listed in Technical Regulations of respective sport.

Medal and Awards-winners are obliged to attend the Awards ceremony.

AWA 3 The winner of the competition (team and individual tournaments) is awarded with the title "European Universities Champion" as listed in Technical Regulations of respective sport.

AWA 4 The list of the additional awards is stipulated in the Technical Regulations of respective sport. The procedure how to determine the winner is published in the Technical Handbook.

AWA 5 Only the awards listed in these regulations could be granted during the Awards ceremony.

AWA 6 EUSA presents following awards after the conclusion of the EUG (normally during the annual EUSA Gala):

AWA 6.1 the Most Active NUSA, **AWA 6.2** the Most Successful NUSA,

AWA 6.3 the Best University,

AWA 6.5 Enno Harms Fair Play Award.

AWA 6.6 The Most Active University

BADMINTON



Modern badminton was introduced in Europe around 1800 by British officials that saw a game called "Poona" in India. It was practiced in the Beaufort Duque's propriety, the Badminton House, originating the sport's name. Badminton became an Olympic Sport in the 1992 Barcelona Games.

The Portuguese Badminton Federation (FPB) regulates Badminton in Portugal. It is filiated in Badminton World Federation, Badminton Europe and the Portuguese Olympic Committee. Its headquarters are in Caldas da Rainha, where the High Performance Centre is also located.

Portugal participated in 6 Olympic Games, Barcelona (with Fernando Silva and Ricardo Fernandes), Sidney and Athens (Marco Vasconcelos), Beijing (Ana Moura and Marco Vasconcelos), London and Rio (Pedro Martins and Telma Santos). It is worth noticing that Ana Moura, the first Portuguese female player to qualify for the Olympic Games was at the time a medical student at the University of Coimbra. Currently, she is a medical doctor at Coimbra University Hospital and coach of the AAC Badminton team.

AAC Badminton section is currently composed of about 200 athletes and is one of the best schools of Badminton in the country.

In the European Universities Badminton Championships 2017, Uludag (TUR) were once again dominant, winning the team competition. The doubles team of Pietryja & Wojtkowska from Opole University (POL) won the Mixed Doubles competition. The womens doubles team of Bayrak & Fere from, once again, Uludag University (TUR) were crowned winners in their competition, with the mens doubles team of Cervelho & Nero from the University of Lisbon (POR) dominating their competition. In the single competitions, Alexander Roovers from the University of Duisburg-Essen (GER) won the male competition, with Neslihan Yigit from Uludag University (TUR) winning gold in the womens.

This year is the 4th edition of the European Universities Games, but in the 2016 edition the winners were Uludag University (TUR) in the Team Competition, Muhammed Ali Kurt, from Erzican University (TUR) in Mens Singles, and Anastasia Chervyakova, from Nizhny Novgorod University (RUS) in Womens Singles. Milosz Bochat and Pavel Pietryja from Opole University (POL) in the Mens Doubles. Anastasiya Dmytryshyn and Yelyzaveta Zharka from Kharkiv Univeristy (UKR) in the Womens Doubles. Julien Maio and Rosy Pancasari, from the University of Strasbourg (FRA) in the Mixed Doubles.

Competition Format

The competitions, will be played in two (2) stages: the first stage will be played in groups, (round robin system) and the second stage will be played in a knock-out format system, set according to the respective sports regulations. Last group matches of the first stage, shall be played at the same time, whenever possible.

Competition system (format) will be prepared in such a way, that competition concludes with matches for all final places (i.e. 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th, 11th, 13th, 15th etc.). Taking part in conciliation tournament is compulsory.

Ranking and Seeding

Both the ranking system and the seeding process should be explained -the pre-tournament ranking will be decided by EUSA and will be based on results from previous EUSA Games and EUSA Championships.

For the seeding in the team competition the teams will be divided according to their

ranking into 5 seeding groups of 4 teams. Group 1 will hold the teams ranked 1 to 5, group 2 will hold the teams 6 to 10 ect, etc.

From each of these seeding groups 1 team will be drawn into 1 of the competition groups, so that at the end there will be 5 groups of 4 teams. For the second stage of the team competition there will be a draw for each of the KO-groups with seeds only for the KO group with group winners.

For the individual competition, seeding will be according to the valid world ranking at the time of the draw which will be done on the day prior to the start of the individual competition.

TEAM'S COMPETITION

Group Stage

During Group Stage, there's a first phase with 5 groups (A, B, C, D, E) of 4 teams each (round robin system).

Afterwards, there's a second phase with 4 groups with 5 teams each as it follows:

K01 1st teams of each 1st phase groups (5 teams)

K02 2nd places of each 1st phase groups (5 teams)

K03 3rd teams of each 1st phase groups (5 teams)

K04 4th places of each 1st phase groups (5 teams)

In each of these 4 KO groups, there's a game that corresponds to a quarter final. The looser of these games will be placed respectively 5th, 10th, 15th and 20th..

After that, for each KO group there's the semi-finals and final, so that in the end of all games we will have for each KO group:

K01 Places 1 to 5 (there is no bronze medal)

K02 Places 6 to 10

K03 Places 11 to 15

K04 Places 16 to 20

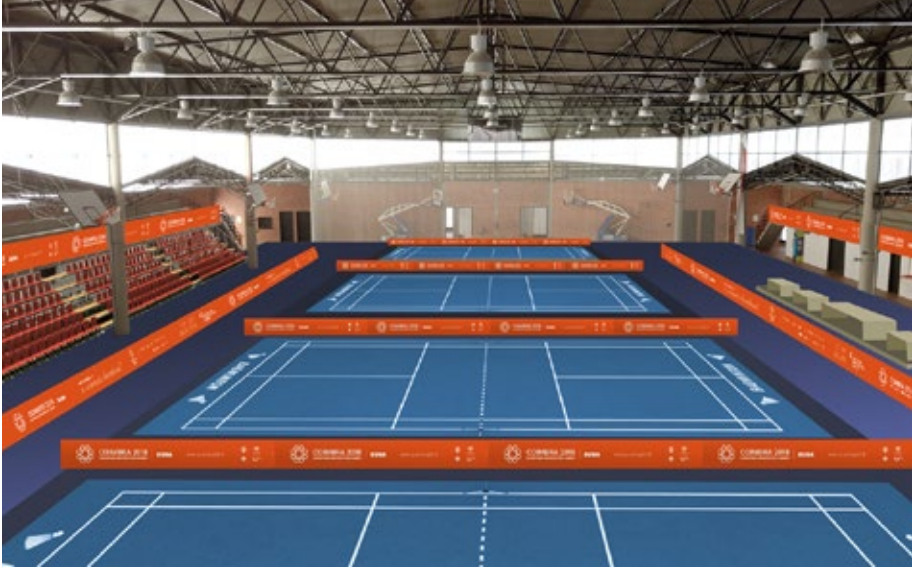

Technical Regulations

Competition will be held following the EUSA document "Rules and Regulations for the European Universities Games 2018".

The organization of the EUG Badminton shall be mainly based on the most recent Technical Regulations of the Badminton World Federation (BWF).

Athletes Sport Equipment and Clothing

All teams participating in the team competition should have 2 (two) different unique team uniforms dresses in 2 (two) different colours (one dark and one with light colours) with them. In the individual competitions doubles and mixed pairs should be dressed in the same colours. If players wear t-shirts with advertising, names or countries, they have to respect the BWF rules about "clothing and advertising".

General Technical Meeting

The GTM is a mandatory part of competition and will be held in **Convento de S. Francisco, on the 13th July at 14h30.**

The GTM is called by the CTC chair together with SCAC representative, one (1) day prior to the start of the competition. Invitees are: the SCAC, the competition commission, the NSF/ESF/ISF representative (if nominated), the OC representatives, the Heads of Delegations (maximum two (2) persons per delegation), the NUSAs coordinators (if present), referees and other guests.

The GTM, after the welcome message of competition commission chair, the GTM is divided in three parts:

First Part: organizational part of the EUG, presented by the OC representative,

Second Part: technical part of the competition, presented by the TD,

Third Part: the draw of the competition (optionally, if required by the competition format), carried out by the TD and EUSA Sport Manager.

The team representatives may ask questions about all aspects of the competition, if times allow its.

The Draw Procedure

The draw procedure will be:

- in agreement with the competition system (format),
- explained to the GTM audience,
- carried out in front of the team representatives.
- The draw procedure cannot be repeated, unless a mistake is done, and this is approved by the TD and SCAC Representative.
- The results of the draw will be delivered to participating teams immediately after the GTM.

Protest on non-technical matters

The SCAC is the highest authority of the EUG and controls overall organizational and technical aspects of the EUG. The SCAC is responsible for the interpretation of EUSA Regulations, for the supervision and smooth running of the EUG, settling any dispute, examining and dealing with

any complaints or protests of a non-technical nature, taking emergency sanctions against participants (teams or individuals) who violate the EUSA Regulations, deciding of any other matters not covered in these Regulations, at the time of the EUG.

Protest on technical match matters

HoD or an authorised representative of a team may file protest on published results to the TD:

- within twenty (20) minutes after the end of the match on match result,
- before the start of next competition day on published result.

Each protest shall be accompanied by a deposit of fifty (50) EUR except for the following sports: Basketball, Handball, Football, Futsal, Rugby 7s and Volleyball where the deposit is two hundred (200) EUR. If the protest is upheld, the fee will be returned. The competition commission deals with the protest and its decision is final.

International Regulations and Exceptions

- The normal BWF clothing, advertising and lettering regulations apply:
- The competition will be played in accordance with the Laws of Badminton, except that the 1,15 mtrs service experiment does not apply to this event.

The role of the Head of Delegation

- make sure that arrival and departure details are sorted, both with team and transport office
- know the schedule of play
- know the transport schedule
- know the lunch and dinner times
- know how to reach emergency services
- have his team ready to play when required
- know how to get in touch with his players at all times
- compose and hand in the team compositions in time
- book practice courts when available
- attend the GTM and any other meeting called by the tournament referee. There may be many more things, but this is already quite an extensive list

BASKETBALL



Basketball is one of the world's most popular and widely watched sports and one of the most enthusiastic and competitive sports in university sports. The game has many individual techniques for displaying skill — ball-handling, shooting, passing, shot-blocking, and rebounding.

Basketball is the 4th biggest sport in Portugal with a number of 40,135 federated athletes.

Important basketball figures in Portugal would be Ticha Penicheiro, who played for 15 years in the WNBA, won a championship in 2005 playing for Sacramento Monarchs and is a national reference for all Portuguese basketball athletes.

In Coimbra the top basketball teams are AAC with strong results in the past years in male competitions and Olivais F.C in female competitions with some National Championships wins in the past.

University of Bologna (ITA) went home with the gold medal in the European Universities Basketball Championship 2017, with the University of Strasbourg (FRA) winning gold in the womens competition.

Back in 2016, at the last edition of the European Universities Games, Vytautas Magnus University (LTU) won the gold, and the home team of University of Zagreb (CRO) pleased the local crowd by taking gold in the final match.

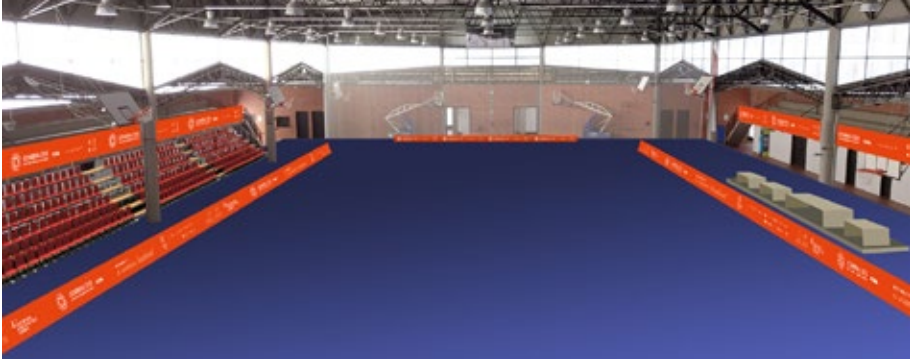

International regulations

The organization of the EUG Basketball shall be mainly based on the most recent Technical Regulations of the International Basketball Federation (FIBA).

Competitions

Team Tournament:

1 (one) men's tournament, maximum of 16 (sixteen) teams,
1 (one) women's tournament, maximum of 12 (twelve) teams.

Programme

The competitions consist of 7 (seven) days, including 1 (one) day of rest for each team. The General Technical Meeting, where the presence of each head of the delegation is obligatory, will be held 1 (one) day prior to the start of the competition.

Delegation

The delegation will consist of a minimum of 10 (ten) and a maximum of 12 (twelve) athletes and a minimum of 1 (one) and a maximum of 5 (five) officials. The head of the delegation and coach must be appointed.

Referees

The delegation shall include a referee with at least the highest national license; the relevant license of the National Basketball Federation must be submitted 2 (two) months prior to the competition. Delegation failing to fulfil this obligation must pay 1,000 EUR to the Organizing Committee. Accommodation and food for the referee must be provided by the OC without charging the participation fee; no refereeing fee is provided. OC shall provide 2 (two) sets of polo shirts per referee.

Playing scheme

The format of the tournament will be decided by Competition Technical Commission taking into consideration the number of teams entered.

Draw, seeding

The draw will be done in the presence of a EUSA representative taking into account the EUSA Basketball ranking. The draw will be carried out in front of the team representatives. The results will be delivered to participating teams immediately after the GTM.

Procedure: Small papers with the names of the teams will be inside "non-transparent balls" in advance. The opening of the balls will be done transparently, showing to the audience who is drawn. The university team of the hosting city or in their absence the hosting country's highest ranked team will be placed on first (1) place in pool A. Teams from the same country shall, whenever possible, be placed in different pools.

The draw procedure cannot be repeated, unless a mistake is done, and this is approved by the TD and SCAC Representative.

Uniforms

All teams have to bring 2 (two) different sets of uniforms, main

colour light and the other dark. During the entire duration of the EUG competition each player must wear the same number

General Technical Meeting

The GTM is a mandatory part of competition and will be held on the 21st of July at 16h30 and will be called by the CTC chair together with SCAC representative. It is divided in three parts:

First Part: organizational part of the EUG, presented by the OC representative;

Second Part: technical part of the competition, presented by the TD;

Third Part: the draw of the competition, carried out by the TD and EUSA Sport Manager.

Who is invited? The SCAC, the competition commission, the NSF/ESF/ISF representative (if nominated), the OC representatives, the Heads of Delegations (maximum two (2) persons per delegation), the NUSAs coordinators (if present), referees and other guests.

The team representatives may ask questions about all aspects of the competition if times allow.

Protests

The HoD or an authorised representative of a team may file protest on published results to the TD. Each protest shall be accompanied by a deposit of two hundred (200) EUR. If the protest is upheld, the fee will be returned. Competition commission deals with the protest and its decision is final.

Protests on technical matters shall be submitted:

within twenty (20) minutes after the end of the match to the TD for the match issues;
before the start of next competition day on published results to the TD for the published issues;
during the competition to the competition commission for technical issues;
during the competition to the SCAC for non-technical issues
within seven (7) days after the EUG to the EUSA EC for the EUG issues
Protests on referee decisions are not allowed, if it is not regulated differently in the ESF/ISF Regulations of the respective sport.

Protests on non-technical matters

3X3 BASKETBALL



Making its first appearance in the Olympic Games in Tokyo 2020, 3x3 basketball is considered the number one urban team sport worldwide and the most played recreational sport on the planet. It is so simple and flexible that it can be played anywhere by anybody, providing fun sportive moments to everyone. It requires few material and the rules are simple: each match lasts a maximum of 10 minutes, with a 12-second shot clock. It is played on half a court, with one hoop. There is no halftime, and no quarters or no time-outs – making the game fast, spectacular and exciting.

This sports modality has been recently introduced in Portugal, therefore these European University Games

will be an excellent opportunity to demonstrate this authentic urban culture atmosphere, which attracts a new young audience.

In 2017, the European Universities 3x3 Basketball Championship was held in Split, with the University of Kragujevac (SRB) taking the gold once again in Croatia. In the womens competition, the Vasyl Stefanyk Precarpathian National University (UKR) won the gold medal.

Two years ago in Rijeka, the Lithuanian Sports University (LTU) won gold in the womens 3x3 Basketball competition, and the University of Kragujevac (SRB) reigned supreme in the mens competition.

The organization of the EUG

3X3 Basketball shall be mainly based on the most recent Technical Regulations of the International Basketball Federation (FIBA).

COMPETITIONS

Team Tournaments:

- 1 (one) men's tournament, maximum of 24 (twenty-four) teams,
- 1 (one) women's tournament, maximum of 16 (sixteen) teams.
- Side tournaments:
 - 1 (one) men's Slam Dunk Contest,
 - 1 (one) men's Three-point Contest,
 - 1 (one) women's Three-point Contest.
- Side tournaments are non-compulsory for participating teams. Entries to these tournaments only are not allowed.

Program

The competitions consist of 3 (three) days. The General Technical Meeting, where the

presence of each head of the delegation is obligatory, will be held 1 (one) day prior to the start of the competition.

Delegation

The delegation will consist of minimum 3 (three) and maximum 4 (four) athletes and minimum of 1 (one) and maximum of 3 (three) officials. The head of the delegation must be appointed.

Referees

OC shall provide referees.

OC shall provide 2 (two) sets of polo shirts per referee.

Playing scheme

The format of the tournament will be decided by the Competition Technical Commission taking into consideration the number of teams entered.

Draw, seeding

The draw will be carried out in front of the team representatives. The draw will be done in the presence of EUSA representative taking into

account EUSA 3X3 Basketball ranking. The results will be delivered to participating teams immediately after the GTM.

Procedure: Small papers with the names of the teams will be inside "non-transparent balls" in advance. The opening of the balls will be done transparently, showing to the audience who is drawn.

The university team of the hosting city or in their absence the hosting country's highest ranked team will be placed on first (1) place in pool A. Teams from the same country shall, whenever possible, be placed in different pools.

The draw procedure cannot be repeated, unless a mistake is done, and this is approved by the TD and SCAC Representative.

Financial obligations

Each team has to pay fees defined in EUG Regulations by the specified date. The deposit must be paid on EUSA request.

Uniforms

All teams have to bring 2 (two) different sets of uniforms, main

colour light and the other dark. During the entire duration of the EUG competition each player must wear the same number.

General Technical Meeting

The GTM is a mandatory part of competition and will be held on the 15th of July at 13h00 and will be called by the CTC chair together with SCAC representative. It is divided in three parts:

First Part: organizational part of the EUG, presented by the OC representative;

Second Part: technical part of the competition, presented by the TD;

Third Part: the draw of the competition, carried out by the TD and EUSA Sport Manager.

Who is invited? The SCAC, the competition commission, the NSF/ESF/ISF representative (if nominated), the OC representatives, the Heads of Delegations (maximum two (2) persons per delegation), the NUSAs coordinators (if present), referees and other guests.

The team representatives may ask questions about all aspects of the competition, if times allow it.

Protests

The HoD or an authorised representative of a team may file protest on published results to the TD. Each protest shall be accompanied by a deposit of two hundred (200) EUR. If the protest is upheld, the fee will be returned. Competition commission deals with the protest and its decision is final.

Protests on technical matters shall be submitted:

within twenty (20) minutes after the end of the match to the TD for the match issues;

before the start of next competition day on published results to the TD for the published issues;

during the competition to the competition commission for technical issues;

during the competition to the SCAC for non-technical issues within seven (7) days after the EUG to the EUSA EC for the EUG issues

Protests on referee decisions are not allowed, if it is not regulated differently in the ESF/ISF Regulations of the respective sport.

Protests on non-technical matters

The SCAC is the highest authority of the EUG and controls overall organizational and technical aspects of the EUG. The SCAC is responsible for the interpretation of EUSA Regulations, for the supervision and smooth running of the EUG, settling any dispute, examining and dealing with any complaints or protests of a non-technical nature, taking emergency sanctions against participants (teams or individuals) who violate the EUSA Regulations, deciding of any other matters not covered in these Regulations, at the time of the EUG.

COMPETITION FORMAT

Ranking and Seeding (For both Men and Women)

During the group stages matches, the teams' ranking in each group will be determined by the higher number of points obtained in all matches played among the teams in question.

The ranking of each team in each group will be determined as follows:

- greater number of points obtained in all group matches;
- greater number of points obtained in the group matches between the teams concerned; greater goal difference resulting from the group matches between the teams concerned;
- greater number of goals scored in all group matches;
- greater number of goals scored in all group matches;
- drawing of lots by the Competition Commission.
- should more than two teams have the same number of points, the criteria listed above apply.
- greater number of goals scored in all group matches between the teams concerned;

COMPETITION

The competitions will be played in two (2) stages: the first stage will be played in groups, (round robin system) and the second stage will be played in a knock-out format system, set according to the respective sports regulations. Last group matches of the first stage shall be played at the same time, whenever possible.

Competition system (format) will be prepared in such a way, that competition concludes with matches for all final places (i.e. 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th, 11th, 13th, 15th etc.). Taking part in conciliation tournament is compulsory.

MEN'S COMPETITION

(11x11)

Men's competition is played in two phases- group stages and knock-out rounds.

Group stages consist of 4 groups of 4 teams each (round robin system). The 1st and 2nd places of each group qualify for next round.

All Matches (except final) are up to the final 35 min per half. The final is 45 min per half. If there's a tie in the knock-out rounds for places 3-16, there will be directly 5 penalty kicks to untie.

If there's a tie in the final, the match will have extra time of two 15 min halves. If still a tie after the extra time, there's 5 penalty kicks to untie.

WOMEN'S COMPETITION

(7X7 format)

Women's competition is played in two phases- group stages and knock-out rounds.

Group stages consists of 4 groups of 3 teams each (round robin system).

1 point each team for tie

0 points for a defeat

The duration of all matches is 25 minutes per half.

All Matches (except final) are up to the final 25 min per half. The final is 30 min per half. If there's a tie in the knock-out rounds for places 3-8, there will be directly 3 penalty kicks to untie.

If there's a tie in the final, the match will have extra time of two 5 min halves. If still a tie after the extra time, there's 3 penalty kicks to untie.

During the entire duration of the EUG competition each player must wear the same number.

The GTM is called by the CTC chair together with SCAC representative, one (1) day prior

to the start of the competition. Invitees are: the SCAC, the competition commission, the NSF/ESF/ISF representative (if nominated), the OC representatives, the Heads of Delegations (maximum two (2) persons per delegation), the NUSAs coordinators (if present), referees and other guests.

After the welcome message of competition commission chair the GTM is divided in three parts:

FUTSAL



Unlike some other forms of indoor football, the game is played on a hardcourt surface delimited by lines; walls or boards are not used. Futsal is also played with a smaller, harder ball. The surface, ball, and rules create an emphasis on improvisation, creativity, and technique as well as ball control and passing in small spaces. Over the last few years, Portuguese futsal went from the most practiced sport recreation to the most practiced indoor sport with larger perspectives of improvement. This year Portugal became European Champion and Ricardinho, a Portuguese player, was considered the best world futsal player for 5 times in a row.

In Coimbra, the AAC futsal team is one of the most ancient clubs of this sports modality in Portugal and has a long list of awards with several wins in the National Futsal Championship. Futsal is in the programme of The European Universities Games since 2012 in Cordoba, Spain.

The University of Beira Interior (POR) took gold back in 2017's Mens competition, with the Moscow Polytechnical University (RUS) reaching the same heights in the Womens competition.

European Universities Games 2016, the winners of the men's tournament were the University of Zagreb (CRO) and the Women's tournament the Moscow State University of Mechanical Engineering (RUS).

Athletes Sport Equipment and Clothing

Each team shall bring 2 (two) sets of player's match kit (shirt, shorts and socks) in different colours (noticeably different in contrast and colours, preferably in light and dark). Each player must wear the same shirt number for the whole competition, and it shall be printed on the shirt in accordance with the FIFA Laws of the Game. In addition, teams shall bring two sets of bibs in different "untypical" (non-common colours used for match kit) colours (different from the match kit colours). During the entire duration of the EUG competition each player must wear the same number.

General Technical Meeting

The GTM is a mandatory part of competition and will be held in Convento de S. Francisco, on the 21st of July at 16h30.

The GTM is called by the CTC chair together with SCAC representative, one (1) day prior to the start of the competition.

After the welcome message of competition commission chair the GTM is divided in three parts:

First Part: organizational part of the EUG, presented by the OC representative,

Second Part: technical part of the competition, presented by the TD,

Third Part: the draw of the competition (optionally, if required by the competition format), carried out by the TD and EUSA Sport Manager.

The team representatives may ask questions about all aspects of the competition, if times allows.

GTM invitees: SCAC, the competition commission, the NSF/ESF/ISF representative (if nominated), the OC representatives, the Heads of Delegations (maximum two (2) persons per delegation), the NUSAs coordinators (if present), referees and other guests.

The Draw Procedure

The draw procedure will be:

- in agreement with the competition system (format),
- explained to the GTM audience,
- carried out in front of the team representatives.

The draw will be done in the presence of EUSA Representative taking into account Futsal EUSA ranking. The university team of the hosting city or, in their absence, the hosting country's highest ranked team will be placed on first (1) place in pool A. Teams from the same country shall, whenever possible, be placed in different pool. The results will be delivered to participating teams immediately after the GTM.

Procedure: Small papers with the names of the teams will be inside "non-transparent balls" in advance. The opening of the balls will be done transparently, showing to the audience who is drawn.

The draw procedure cannot be repeated, unless a

mistake is done, and this is approved by the TD and SCAC Representative.

The results of the draw will be delivered to participating teams immediately after the GTM.

Protest on non-technical matters

REG 32 The SCAC is the highest authority of the EUG and controls overall organizational and technical aspects of the EUG. The SCAC is responsible for the interpretation of EUSA Regulations, for the supervision and smooth running of the EUG, settling any dispute, examining and dealing with any complaints or protests of a non-technical nature, taking emergency sanctions against participants (teams or individuals) who violate the EUSA Regulations, deciding of any other matters not covered in these Regulations, at the time of the EUG.

Protest on technical match matters

The Head of delegation or an authorised representative of a team may file protest on

published results to the TD:

- within twenty (20) minutes after the end of the match on match result,
- before the start of next competition day on published result.

Each protest shall be accompanied by a deposit of two hundred (200) EUR. If the protest is upheld, the fee will be returned. The competition commission will deal with the protest and its decision is final.

International Regulations and Exceptions

Role and Responsibilities of Head Delegation

Upon arrival at the playing court, the head of delegation must identify himself to the person in charge of the court and he/she will grant him access to the changing room. We kindly ask for a proper use of the changing rooms, keeping in mind that they will be used by other teams.

The head of delegation must fill in the relevant documentation for each game and deliver it to the match commissioner well in advance in order to let him do his job in optimum conditions.

At the end of the game, the head of delegation must receive the relevant documentation, which will be delivered by the match commissioner or his assistant. Head of delegation must confirm the information in the match report by a signature. Once the team has finished using the changing rooms, the head of delegation must ensure the return of the changing room keys to the person in charge of the court.

Regulations for Teams

The teams will not be able to occupy the court until the previous game has ended and the organization grants them access for warm-up. In case they wish to start the warm-up earlier, they should ask the person in charge of the court for a place to do it.

The whole amount of balls provided must be returned to the person in charge after the warm-up.

Ranking

This ranking has been prepared to be used by EUSA Technical Delegates to assigning the teams to proper positions during EUGs drawing. Country ranking is determined by points obtained by the highest classified respective country team in concerned sport from the previous four years. Only one team per country may be seeded using this ranking. Allocation of seeding points is indicated in the table attached. Points for final placement are given in accordance with the EUSA Rules and Regulations for the EUG.

Sport Regulations for other Awards

Regarding the attribution of other Awards:

Fair Play Cup will be granted to the Team that has obtained the greatest number of positive points, verified by the following criteria:

- 20 (twenty) points to each team after each match
- Deduction of 5 (five) points to each team per each received yellow card

- Deduction of 10 (ten) points to each team per each received red card
- To each team officials member, who is sent off, 10 (ten) points will be deducted.
- Accumulated fouls – 1 point for each fault.

The Fair Play Cup will be granted to the Team, which at the end of the competition obtains the greatest number of points.

- In case of a draw, in the final standings, the Fair Play Cup winner will be decided by the Technical Committee. If necessary, the criteria for decisions will be applied.

Most Valuable Player and Most Valuable Goalkeeper in the competition will be decided by the Technical Committee on the basis of a vote taken among coaches of participating teams. Each coach will vote 5 (five) Most Valuable players, one of them must be a goalkeeper, by the following criteria:

- 3 (three) points to Most Valuable player;
- 1 (one) point to other Most Valuable players;
- Coach cannot vote players from his team and his country.

Top goal scorer cup will be granted to the Player who scores the greatest number of goals in the competition. If two or more players are equal on number of goals scored, the following criteria are applied to determine the ranking:

- Player on better regularity performance, who has scored in the greatest number of matches;
- Player who scored more without counting scores by 6 (six) meter penalty;
- Player who scored more without counting scores by 10 (ten) meter penalty;
- Player who were not punished with red card;
- Player who were not punished with yellow card
- Player who were punished with smaller number of yellow cards;
- Player who have participated in fewer numbers of matches and who did not get a red card or a second yellow card as punishment.



HANDBALL



Handball is a team sport in which two teams of seven players each (six outfield players and a goalkeeper) pass a ball using their hands with the aim of throwing it into the goal of the other team. Players need to have a lot of speed, power, agility and technical skills and it is one of the most competitive in University Sports.

Handball is also one of the most played indoor sports currently with 40,000 federated athletes in Portugal. It has about 28% of participants in school taking it as a subject with an average of 5,000 students per year.

The Handball Section is one of the most ancient of Associação Académica de Coimbra (AAC) and has a tradition in Young and Universities Sports.

In 2017 the European Universities Handball Championship was held in Antequera, Spain, welcoming a number of high quality teams. The German Sport University Cologne (GER) were eventually crowned champions of the Mens competition, and Ștefan cel Mare University of Suceava (ROU) were crowned winners of the female competition.

The latest European Universities Games were held in Zagreb and Rijeka in the summer of 2016, the University of Nis (SRB) beat top competition to grab gold. Whereas in the womens competition, the University of Rijeka (CRO) won gold in the own backyard.

Athletes Sport Equipment and Clothing

Each team is required to have at least 1 (one) full team kit in light colors and one full team kit in dark colors (blue and red are considered dark colors) for the matches of the EUG. Goalkeepers' kit must differ from court players' kit in both light and dark colors kit options.

Each protest shall be accompanied by a deposit of two hundred (200) EUR. If the protest is upheld, the fee will be returned. The competition commission will deal with the protest and its decision is final.

International Regulations and Exceptions

The EUC Handball 2018 will be played according to the latest regulations approved by IHF. The preliminary round is played in groups.

The teams are divided in groups on the basis of the results of the draw conducted at the General Technical Meeting.

The draw will be done in the presence of the EUSA

Representative taking into account the EUSA Handball ranking. The university team of the hosting city or, in their absence, the hosting country's highest ranked team will be placed on first (1) place in pool A. Teams from the same country shall, whenever possible, be placed in different pools.

Preliminary round

Matches shall be evaluated as follows:

- each match won = 2 points
- each match drawn = 1 point for each team
- each match lost = no points

Teams are ranked according to the total number of points gained. If two or more teams have gained the same number of points after the group matches have been completed, classification is decided as follows:

- results in points between the teams concerned
- goal differences in the matches between the teams concerned
- greater number of plus goals in the matches between the

teams concerned.

- If the teams are still equal, a decision is made between those teams with equal number of points as follows:
- goal difference is subtracted in all matches
- greater number of plus goals in all matches.

If classification is still not possible, a draw shall decide. The IHF representative on site shall execute the draw, if possible in the presence of the 'responsible team officials'. If the 'responsible team official' cannot be present, other co-workers selected by the IHF shall take part.

Finals

After completion of the preliminary round, the finals shall be played in accordance with the knock-out system.

Overtime is played, following a 5-minute break, if a game is tied at the end of the regular playing time and a winner has to be determined. The overtime period consists of 2 halves of 5 minutes, with a 1-minute half-time break.

Should the match still not be

decided after the overtime period, it is decided with 7 m penalty throws in accordance with Rule 2:2 of the Rules of the Game.

The IHF COC has the right to decide that certain matches will be executed with direct 7m penalty throws in accordance with Rule 2:2 of the Rules of the Game. If this rule applies, the decision will be published in the official announcement or together with the match schedule.

Rule 2:2

Should the match still not be decided after the overtime period, the winner will be determined in accordance with the rules for the particular competition. In the case that the decision is to use 7-metre throwing as tiebreaker to decide a winner, the procedures indicated below shall be followed.

If 7-metre throwing is used as a tie-breaker, players who are not suspended or disqualified at the end of the playing time are entitled to participate. Each team nominates 5 players. These players make one throw each, alternating with the players of the other team.

The teams are not required to predetermine the sequence of their throwers.

Goalkeepers may be freely chosen and substituted among the players eligible to participate. Players may participate in the 7-metre throwing as both throwers and goalkeepers.

The referees decide which goal is used. The referees make a coin toss, and the winning team chooses whether they wish to throw first or last. The opposite sequence is used for all subsequent throws, if the throwing has to continue because the score is still tied after the first five throws each.

For such a continuation, each team shall again nominate five players. All or some of them may be the same as in the first round. This method of nominating five players at a time continues as long as it is necessary. However, the winner is now decided as soon as there is a goal difference after both teams have had the same number of throws.

Players may be disqualified from further participation in the 7-metre throwing in cases of significant or repeated unsportsmanlike conduct (16:6e). If this concerns a

player who has just been nominated in a group of five throwers, the team must nominate another thrower.

Team-Time Out

According to Rule 2:10 and Clarification 3 of the Rules of the Game each team has the right to receive a maximum of three team time-outs during regular playing time but not during overtime. No more than two team time-outs may be granted in each half of the regular playing time. Between two team time-outs of a team, the opponent must be at least once in possession of the ball. 3 green cards, bearing numbers 1, 2, and 3 respectively, are available for each team. The teams receive cards bearing numbers '1' and '2' in the first half of the game and the cards no. 2 and no. 3 in the second half provided they received no more than one team time-out in the first half. In case they received two team time-outs in the first half, they receive only green card no. 3. Within the last 5 minutes of the regular playing time only one team time-out per team is allowed.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS FOR EUG 2018 HANDBALL

- The half-time break will be 10 minutes.
- If a game is tied at the end of the regular playing time in the placement matches for the position 1 till 4, will be used only one overtime (2 x 5 min) and then, if necessary, a winner will be determined by using 7-meter-throws according the Rule 2:2
- If a game is tied at the end of the regular playing time in the placement matches for the position 5 till 12 a winner will be determined immediately by using 7-meter-throws according the Rule 2:2.
- The direct disqualification of player or team official (red card) will be automatically connected (without disciplinary procedure) with disqualification for the next following match.
- The disqualification with report of player or team official (blue card) will be automatically connected (without disciplinary procedure) with disqualification for the next 2 following matches.

ROWING

Our best Olympic athletes are Pedro Fraga and Nuno Mendes, which compete in the double scull light weight category and have some remarkable results in this specialty.

The Nautical Sports Section of Associação Académica de Coimbra was the National Clubs Champion in 2007/08, 2008/09 and 2009/10, counting more than 100 national titles at various levels, as well as internationalizations of several of its athletes, in World Championships, Universiades and other events.

RUGBY 7'S



Sevens is a variant of rugby union in which teams are made up of seven players playing seven minute halves, instead of the usual 15 players playing 40 minute halves.

Due to the shorter time of the game, the intense agility and the technical skills of the players make this discipline a particularly enthusiastic sport.

The game is popular at all levels, with amateur and club tournaments generally held in the summer months. Sevens is one of the most well distributed forms of rugby, and is popular in parts of Africa, Asia, Europe, and the Americas, and especially in the South Pacific.

Portugal has achieved interesting results in the Past with eight European titles from 2002 to 2011.

In Coimbra Académica is one of the greatest rugby teams

in Portugal and has a long list of awards, standing out four national titles and six Cups of Portugal in Rugby.

Rugby Sevens is in the programme of The European Universities Games since 2012 in Cordoba, Spain. In 2017, the University Toulouse III - Paul Sabatier (FRA) competition eventually came out on top in the Womens Competition, and the Georgian National University SEU (GEO) won by a large margin in the final of the Mens competition.

Athletes Sport Equipment and Clothing

Uniforms should meet World Rugby specifications (Chapter 4). Each team should bring 2 (two) sets of jerseys in different colors. A player wears a jersey, shorts and underwear, socks and boots and may wear shin guards, mitts (fingerless gloves), shoulder pads, a mouth guard or dental protector, a headgear and bandages and/or tapes to cover or protect any injury. The studs of players' boots must conform to the World Rugby specifications and a player must not wear a single stud at the toe of the boot. Detailed information relating to the permitted specifications for clothing and studs may be found in World Rugby specifications (Section 3, Regulation 12). During the entire duration of the EUG competition each player must wear the same number.

General Technical Meeting

The GTM is a mandatory part of competition and will be held in Convento de S. Francisco, on the 24th of July at 14h30.

The GTM is called by the CTC chair together with SCAC representative, one (1) day prior to the start of the competition.

After the welcome message of competition commission chair, the GTM is divided in three parts:

First Part organizational part of the EUG, presented by the OC representative,

Second Part technical part of the competition, presented by the TD,

Third Part the draw of the competition (optionally, if required by the competition format), carried out by the TD and EUSA Sport Manager.

Invitees of the GTM: SCAC, the competition commission, the NSF/ESF/ISF representative (if nominated), the OC representatives, the Heads of Delegations (maximum two (2) persons per delegation), the NUSAs coordinators (if present), referees and other guests.

The team representatives may ask questions about all aspects of the competition, if time allows.

The Draw Procedure

The draw procedure will be:

- in agreement with the competition system (format)
- explained to the GTM audience
- carried out in front of the team representatives.

The draw will be done in the presence of EUSA Representative taking into account Rugby EUSA ranking. The university team of the hosting city or, in their absence, the hosting country's highest ranked team will be placed on first (1) place in pool A. Teams from the same country shall, whenever possible, be placed in different pool. The results will be delivered to participating teams immediately after the GTM.

Procedure: Small papers with the names of the teams will be inside "non-transparent balls" in advance. The opening of the balls will be done transparently, showing to the audience who is drawn.

The draw procedure cannot be repeated, unless a mistake is done, and this is approved by the TD and SCAC Representative.

The results of the draw will be delivered to participating teams immediately after the GTM.

Protest on non-technical matters

REG 32 The SCAC is the highest authority of the EUG and controls overall organizational and technical aspects of the EUG. The SCAC is responsible for the interpretation of EUSA Regulations, for the supervision and smooth running of the EUG, settling any dispute, examining and dealing with any complaints or protests of a non-technical nature, taking emergency sanctions against participants (teams or individuals) who violate the EUSA Regulations, deciding of any other matters not covered in these Regulations, at the time of the EUG.

Protest on technical match matters

The Head of delegation or an authorised representative of a team may file protest on published results to the TD: within twenty (20) minutes after the end of the match on match result, before the start of next competition day on published result.

Each protest shall be accompanied by a deposit of two hundred (200) EUR. If the protest is upheld, the fee will be returned. The competition commission will deal with the protest and its decision is final.

In the Womens Doubles, the pairs team of Wabik & Nowacka, from University School of Physical Education in Wroclaw (POL) took home gold. In the Womens Singles, Anna Blazhko from the Kazan Innovative University named after V.G. Timiryasov (RUS) won a convincing final match to take gold. Angelus Silesius State School of Higher Vocational Education in Walbrzych (POL) won once more in the Mens Single, with Robert Floras winning the final match.

Back in the 2016, the Mens, and the Womens Team competition was won by Russian State University for Humanities (RUS). Shamin & Pulnyy, Russian State University for the Humanities (RUS) in men's doubles and Gencay Menge, Marmara University (TUR) in men's singles. In women's category, Sikorska and Bak, Kozminski University (POL) won the title in doubles, with Sikorska also winning the champion's title in singles.

TENNIS



Tennis is one of the most popular individual sports in the world and it is played at all levels of society and at all ages.

Its origins go back to the 11th century in France and the game was played with the hands. It was called “Jeu de Paume”. In the 15th century the sport came to Poland and the players started to play with rackets. Later the game would be refined in England in the 19th century as lawn tennis to resemble more the sport we play today.

With an athlete in the top 50, João Sousa, Portugal hosts ATP and WTA Estoril Open tournaments (the latter now renamed Portugal Open).

Portugal's first appearance at the Davis Cup happened in 1925. During this time, its

best performance reached the World Group play-offs, which it achieved in 1994 and 2017.

In 2010, the 7th European University Tennis Championship was held in Coimbra, which came as a chance to promote tennis as a growing national school sport activity.

Camilo José Cela University (ESP) from Madrid took the gold medal in the mens competition in their own university campus, with the University of Bordeaux (FRA) winning gold in the womens competition.

One year earlier, the Erasmus University Rotterdam (NED) were the team who came out on top in Croatia, and in the womens competition, the University of Coimbra (POR) took home the gold medal.

TECHNICAL REGULATIONS

International regulations

The organization of the EUG Tennis shall be mainly based on the most recent Technical

Regulations of the International Tennis Federation (ITF). Depending on the number of teams and available courts, a rule from the US Tennis Association USTA (8 (eight) point pro set) might be used.

Competitions

Team Tournaments:

- 1 (one) men's tournament, maximum of 16 (sixteen) teams,
- 1 (one) women's tournament, maximum of 16 (sixteen) teams.

Each tie will include 2 (two) singles and 1 (one) doubles match.

Program

The competitions consist of 7 (days) The General Technical Meeting, where the presence of each head of the delegation is obligatory, will be held 1 (one) day prior to the start of the competition.

Delegation

The delegation will consist of minimum 2 (two) and maximum 4 (four) athletes and maximum of 3 (three) officials. The head of the delegation must be appointed.

Referees

The OC shall provide referees.

Playing scheme

The format of the tournament will be decided by Competition Technical Commission taking into consideration the number of teams entered.

Draw, seeding

The draw will be done in the presence of EUSA Representative taking into account ATP/WTa and EUSA Tennis ranking. The university team of the hosting city or, in their absence, the hosting country's highest ranked team will be placed on first (1) place in pool A. Teams from the same country shall, whenever possible, be placed in different pool. The results will be delivered to participating teams immediately after the GTM.

Procedure: Small papers with the names of the teams will be inside "non-transparent balls" in advance. The opening of the balls will be done transparently, showing to the audience who is drawn.

The draw procedure cannot

be repeated, unless a mistake is done, and this is approved by the TD and SCAC Representative.

Financial obligations

Each team has to pay fees defined in EUG Regulations by the specified date. The deposit must be paid on EUSA request.

Uniforms

According to ITF tournaments code of conduct.

General Technical Meeting

The GTM is a mandatory part of competition and will be held in Convento de S. Francisco, on the 14th of July at 14h30 and will be called by the CTC chair together with SCAC representative. It is divided in three parts:

First Part: organizational part of the EUG, presented by the OC representative;

Second Part: technical part of the competition, presented by the TD;

Third Part: the draw of the competition, carried out by the TD and EUSA Sport Manager. Who is invited? The SCAC, the

competition commission, the NSF/ESF/ISF representative (if nominated), the OC representatives, the Heads of Delegations (maximum two (2) persons per delegation), the NUSAs coordinators (if present), referees and other guests.

The team representatives may ask questions about all aspects of the competition, if times allows.

Protests

The HoD or an authorised representative of a team may file protest on published results to the TD. Each protest shall be accompanied by a deposit of two hundred (50) EUR. If the protest is upheld, the fee will be returned. Competition commission deals with the protest and its decision is final.

Protests on technical matters shall be submitted:

- within twenty (20) minutes after the end of the match to the TD for the match issues;
- before the start of next competition day on published results to the TD for the published issues;

- during the competition to the competition commission for technical issues;
- during the competition to the SCAC for non-technical issues
- within seven (7) days after the EUG to the EUSA EC for the EUG issues

Protests on referee decisions are not allowed, if it is not regulated differently in the ESF/ISF Regulations of the respective sport.

Protests on non-technical matters

The SCAC is the highest authority of the EUG and controls overall organizational and technical aspects of the EUG. The SCAC is responsible for the interpretation of EUSA Regulations, for the supervision and smooth running of the EUG, settling any dispute, examining and dealing with any complaints or protests of a non-technical nature, taking emergency sanctions against participants (teams or individuals) who violate the EUSA Regulations, deciding of any other matters not covered in these Regulations, at the time of the EUG.

VOLLEYBALL



Volleyball is one of the five big international sports, and the FIVB, with its 220 affiliated national federations, is the largest international sporting federation in the world.

Volleyball has witnessed unprecedented growth over the last two decades. With the great success of world competitions such as the FIVB World Championships, the FIVB World League, the FIVB World Cup as well as the Olympic Games, the level of participation at all levels internationally continues to grow exponentially.

Volleyball was introduced in Portugal by the American troops stationed on the Azores Island during the 1st World War.

The Associação Cristã da Mocidade (ACM) had an important role in the dissemination of volleyball in Portugal and made possible the

publication of the first book of rules, as well as the foundation of the Association of Volleyball of Lisbon, on 28 December of 1938.

The Portuguese Volleyball Federation was created on April 7, 1947 in Lisbon and was one of the founders of the International Volleyball Federation.

The Mens team from the University of Rzeszow (POL) won in the home town, in the 2017 championships, with the Womens competition being won by University "Vasile Alecsandri" of Bacau (ROU), retaining their 2016 title.

In the latest edition of the European Universities Games, the winner of the women's tournament was the University "Vasile Alecsandri" of Bacau (ROU) and the winner of the men's tournament was the University of Nice (FRA).

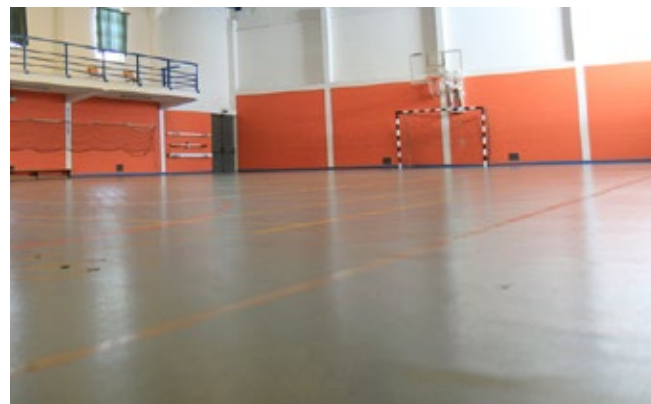

TECHNICAL REGULATIONS

Competition will be held following the EUSA document "Rules and Regulations for the European Universities Games 2018".

The organization of the EUG Table Tennis and Para Table Tennis will be based on the most recent Technical Regulations of the Fédération Internationale de Volleyball (FIVB).

Athletes Sport Equipment and Clothing

EUSA rules concerning players' uniform are based on FIVB Rules. Uniform consists of a jersey (shirt), short, training suit, and must be the same for the whole team. The libero has to wear the same uniform in a different colour. Player equipment (accessories)

consists of shoes, knee-guards, ankle supporters and elbow protections. Sleeves for legs and arms have to be in the main colour of the shirt. All letters and numbers (university name/code, player's registered jersey name and player's numbers) on the player uniforms must be Latin characters and must be in contrasting colours to the part of the uniform where they are placed. Numbers has to be placed on front and back side of jerseys. During the entire duration of the EUC competition each player must wear the same number.
